RABBI'S MESSAGE

EVERY DAY IS ROSH HASHANA

*In your wisdom, God, You renew each day, the miracle of Creation.
Yet we, your children, tend to accept the awesome rise of the warming sun
without the courtesy of a silent thanks...*

These opening lines of "A Parent's Prayer," were written 45 years ago and recited by the poet at a bar mitzvah. The poet is now about to celebrate her 86th birthday. She recently participated in the wedding of her eldest grandchild. She has enjoyed playing with three grandchildren and one great grandchild. With her husband of 63 years, she raised three adult children who have strived in their professional lives to make the world a better place. Her middle son became a rabbi.

Yes, the 1974 bar mitzvah, complete with checkered bellbottom pants and a polka-dot bow tie, was mine. I have recited my mother's poetry often to celebrate new babies and bar or bat mitzvahs. Each time I reread those words, I think about the child who is being blessed on that day and consider the joys and complications of relationships between parents, children and community. I also think about my own relationships and try to add my personal silent thanks.

In Chapters 7 and 8 of Deuteronomy, we learn about abundance and hardship. Moses reminds the children of Israel of their journey in the wilderness, with times of hunger that were then satisfied by manna "...to teach you that man does not live by bread alone..." (8:3). We are reminded that faith and devotion can help us through the most difficult of times. Three Hebrew words express the process of gratitude: *v'achalta*, *v'sa-va-ta*, *u-ve-rachta* – Eat, Be Satisfied, and Bless (8:10). When we enjoy our gifts, it's time to offer blessings.

I believe these words are not just about food. We don't just fill our bodies; we fill our lives. The abundance of food God promised us in the new land is only a beginning. We can fill our lives with song, with beauty, with love and with challenges. Every moment is a chance to breathe in the spirit of the Divine, to embrace our fellow human beings, to learn something new, to enhance someone else's life and to be enriched by others.

On Rosh Hashana, we think about the year that was and the year that will be. We try to connect with God on this day, praying that the next year will be better than the last. It's a great opportunity to begin the year with the spirit of gratitude. We can accept that our connections are not limited to those days and times when we attend a worship service that reminds us to become our best selves. We can seize the opportunity, every day, to acknowledge the blessings we already enjoy and more blessings to anticipate. We can welcome challenges that help us develop strength and determination. And we can offer a silent thanks that the sun continues to rise, the grass continues to grow, and our lives will continue to be filled.

Shana Tova! Happy New Year! And Happy New Day!

CASTING OUR SINS UPON THE WATERS

Shabbat service will be off-site in Kingwood, not at TBT this Shabbat

TBT will gather together on the Friday night between Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur at the home of Mike Stark for Shabbat and Tashlich. Tashlich is the custom during the 10 Days of Awe to connect to the teachings of the prophet Micah, who said "He (God) will take us back in love; He will cover up our iniquities. You will cast all their sins into the depths of the sea." (7:19) For hundreds of years, Jewish people have gathered at a body of water and tossed breadcrumbs into the water to symbolize tossing away the "crumbly" things we've done as we commit to doing better in the coming year. The lake behind Mike's house serves as the body of water, which will accept our sins (breadcrumbs) and help them float away. After some Shabbat singing and worship, we will enjoy a Shabbat meal, generously donated by the Stark family, and those who wish may bring a dessert.

Create Your Jewish Legacy at Temple Beth Torah

What better way to help Temple Beth Torah remain a force in our community to inspire individuals and families to embrace Jewish values and practices that strengthen Judaism's role at home, in the synagogue, and in the general community.

Temple Beth Torah was selected to participate in the Houston Jewish Community Foundation's "Create a Legacy Program." We are one of about 20 organizations in the Houston area that were chosen to be part of this.

You can participate by simply signing the one page "Letter of Intent," which declares your intent to leave something (the amount is optional) to Temple Beth Torah at the time of your passing.

The formalization can come later, and you DO NOT have to change an existing Will or Estate plan to do this. Your IRA, 401k or Life Insurance policy is generally separate from your Will. A simple "Change of Beneficiary" form for your IRA or Life Insurance Policy document, easily obtainable at the financial institution that holds these assets, can be used to allocate any amount you choose to TBT at the time of your passing. There is no minimum.

DONATIONS

Making a donation to TBT is a perfect way to honor a joyous occasion, like a birthday, anniversary, wedding/engagement, new home, job change, or retirement. It is also appropriate to honor someone who has passed away with a donation in his/her memory at the time of the passing or on the yahrtzeit (anniversary) of the passing. All donations to Temple Beth Torah are tax deductible. You can choose where you would like your donation to be applied.

GENERAL FUND

Any donation that is not specified to another specific fund goes to the General Fund, which helps maintain the operating budget of the temple. Building expenses, insurance, staff salaries and all program expenses that are not underwritten come out of the General Fund, as well as support for the Religious School.

RABBI'S DISCRETIONARY FUND

This separate tzedakah fund enables the rabbi to make confidential contributions to help individuals and causes that may be in crisis. The rabbi may also use this fund to help support unbudgeted programs that will benefit the temple or community.

BURT LEVY MEMORIAL LIBRARY FUND

This fund maintains the library and helps purchase new books. Our library, located in the back of the sanctuary, is named after TBT's founding president, Burt Levy, who was a major inspiration in starting Temple Beth Torah.

TRACY TOBIN JOHNSON MEMORIAL EDUCATION FUND

This fund provides scholarships to Jewish summer camps for children and for educational conferences for teachers. It also helps support special educational programs that are not in the general budget. The fund honors Tracy Tobin Johnson, who was an active TBT member, volunteer and teacher before passing away at a young age.

TOM THERIOT MEMORIAL PROGRAM FUND

This fund supports special dynamic programs, often related to the arts. It is named after Tom Theriot, a lover of the arts, who was a constant presence at TBT and supported every cause.

Torah Portions for September 2019

Summarized by Rabbi Dan Gordon

Sept 6-7, Shoftim, Deuteronomy 16:18-21:9

Bribery is forbidden and honesty is valued overall. Other governmental layers are described, including priests and even, eventually, kings. Kings must not be tempted by too much money or too many wives. The king must always keep a Torah with him, reminding him that God is the ultimate authority. Refuge cities are set up for those who kill accidentally. The death penalty is for malicious murder, but only with the collaboration of two or three witnesses; one witness is not sufficient. In the case of an unsolved murder, the priests are to pray for atonement for the whole city. We are instructed to appoint judges, and to make sure the judges are fair with all their decisions.

Sept 13-14, Ki Tetze, Deuteronomy 21:10-25:19

There are seventy-two commandments in *Ki Tetze*, the largest number in any Torah portion. Topics covered include marriage and divorce, defiant children, fair weights and measures and charity for the poor. At the end of the *parsha* we are instructed to "blot out the memory of Amalek from under heaven." While some look at Amalekites as a group of people, others have considered "Amalek" as the force of evil and hatred within our hearts. Many of the regulations teach us about righteous living. Others, such as how to handle a defiant child, convey problematic approaches that must be studied in the context of time, and perhaps should be read metaphorically. The punishment for a defiant child appears to suggest he be stoned to death. Since there are no references in which this punishment was actually administered, we can assume the Torah is encouraging us to look closely at behavior before casting immediate judgment.

Sept 20-21, 2019 Ki Tavo, Deuteronomy 26:1-29:8

The *parshah* begins with a description of a ceremony to commemorate the occupation of the land. Some of every first fruit of the soil will be given to the priest as the exodus experience is retold. A tenth of the yield must be set-aside for the Levite, the stranger, the fatherless and the widow. Blessings and curses, some extremely graphic, are recited to motivate the people to observe the covenant.

Sept 27-28, 2019 Nitzavim, Deuteronomy 29:9-30:20

Nitzavim is read twice a year: once on its calendar date and once on Yom Kippur. It is no mere recapitulation but instead is a talk about the future. Moses' speech to the Israelites just before they enter the Land of Israel reveals that in Judaism, belief flows from behavior. Moses reminds the Israelites that God's words, teachings and spirit are not meant to be distant, but are close to us, in our hearts.

Renovations to the Burt Levy Memorial Library

Temple Beth Torah has a new and renovated Burt Levy Memorial Library. We would like to give a special thank you to Iris Kelley and her team, Debye Lurie, Roger Zevallos, and Mike Weisberg.
