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### RABBI'S MESSAGE

#### A New Look at Gratitude

The entire month of November builds toward the season of Thanksgiving...and Thanksgiving is a good time to focus on our values related to gratitude. We visualize images of sharing a grand meal with beloved family members and friends and put a pause on diets to indulge in the most delicious foods. Many will also take time to offer appreciation of the abundant gifts we've received from the Blessed Holy One. Thanksgiving begins the season of gratitude, leading toward the rest of the "holiday season" that may include vacation time, parties and the giving and receiving of more human and material gifts.

It is important to acknowledge that the classic vision of Thanksgiving does not appear for everyone. Some tables may include empty spaces that were once filled by loved ones who are no longer present. Perhaps the person who brought the family together has passed away, and things just aren't "the same." Adult children may have moved away and have their own families to visit. Some families have experienced such strife that a holiday gathering doesn't work like it might have in the past. Some families have been separated by strong disagreements and feel too estranged to get together. Or perhaps financial hardship or health situations make any kind of expected celebration produce more stress than joy. For one reason or other, this time of that is designated for togetherness could be a very lonely time.

During difficult, lonely times, it is not easy to look at what we have versus what we lack. One of the most complicated books of the Bible is Job. When things were wonderful for Job, he praised G-d. When everything fell apart, he praised G-d. "The LORD gives, the LORD takes away; blessed be the name of the LORD." (Job 1:21) We learn from Job that everything that is precious is temporary. That is a hard lesson, especially because Job's abundance was SO abundant, and his hardships were SO hard. Despite his suffering, Job became content with how his life had changed. This Biblical tale is cryptic in nature, but with careful study, it's possible to find connections to real and personal situations.

I have found myself repeatedly inspired by a book called *The Beggar King and the Secret to Happiness*. The author, Joel ben Izzy, mixes in his personal true story around a legend about King Solomon. In the *midrashic* story about the wise king, Solomon is mysteriously thrown out of his kingdom and wanders the world as an anonymous beggar. Nobody he encounters believes he is the king, and he suffers beatings and abuse until he acquiesces to finding legitimate work and struggles as a laborer. After a journey of many surprisingly difficult years, he finds his way back to his kingdom. A changed person from the experience, Solomon rules much differently as the ruler who knows what it is like to suffer. Ben Izzy was a successful professional storyteller/performing artist who lost his voice to throat cancer. No longer able to use the talents he had been blessed with, he had to find other ways to communicate. At first, like Solomon, he felt he had lost his sense of self because his identity was wrapped up in his role. Like Solomon, Joel ben Izzy was able to find his voice in other ways to develop a different self that was enhanced by his experiences.

As we approach the season of Thanksgiving, if our celebrations are filled with joy, perhaps we can find ways to include others who may not be feeling the same way. And if holiday time feels more stressful than joyous, perhaps we can look at the lessons we learn from changes in our lives. Whether or not these changes are welcome or expected, we can evolve an identity and sense of self to create new ways to be grateful.

## A QUICK DIP TO REFRESH YOUR SOUL



Have you ever been at the temple and felt an inspiration to make a spontaneous *tzedakah* gift, but didn't have any cash or a checkbook with you? Well, there is a new kind of *tzedakah* box now at Temple Beth Torah; not a "tip jar," but a "Dip Jar." Just stick your credit card in the slot, you'll hear a subtle chime, and TBT will instantly receive your tax-deductible gift. It will appear on your credit card statement as a donation to Temple Beth Torah, and the temple will be informed to be able to acknowledge the gift and keep a record for taxes. The Dip Jar will have a set, standard amount for contributions, initially \$36, but that may change depending on response.

Why \$36? Because 18 is the numerical value of CHAI, the Hebrew word for "life." Jewish monetary gifts are often given in multiples of 18 as a lucky number. A legend teaches that there are 36 *tzaddikim* (righteous people) in the world at all times, called the *Lamed Vavniks* (for the numerical values of the letters lamed and vav). These people don't even know who they are, but according to the legend, the world is sustained because of their righteousness.

## **Create Your Jewish Legacy at Temple Beth Torah**

What better way to help Temple Beth Torah remain a force in our community to inspire individuals and families to embrace Jewish values and practices that strengthen Judaism's role at home, in the synagogue, and in the general community.

Temple Beth Torah was selected to participate in the Houston Jewish Community Foundation's "Create a Legacy Program." We are one of about 20 organizations in the Houston area that were chosen to be part of this.

You can participate by simply signing the one page "Letter of Intent," which declares your intent to leave something (the amount is optional) to Temple Beth Torah at the time of your passing.

The formalization can come later, and you DO NOT have to change an existing Will or Estate plan to do this. Your IRA, 401k or Life Insurance policy is generally separate from your Will. A simple "Change of Beneficiary" form for your IRA or Life Insurance Policy document, easily obtainable at the financial institution that holds these assets, can be used to allocate any amount you choose to TBT at the time of your passing. There is no minimum.

### RABBI'S DISCRETIONARY FUND

### BURT LEVY MEMORIAL LIBRARY FUND

This fund maintains the library and helps purchase new books. Our library, located in the back of the sanctuary, is named after TBT's founding president, Burt Levy, who was a major inspiration in starting Temple Beth Torah.

### TRACY TOBIN JOHNSON MEMORIAL EDUCATION FUND

This fund provides scholarships to Jewish summer camps for children and for educational conferences for teachers. It also helps support special educational programs that are not in the general budget. The fund honors Tracy Tobin Johnson, who was an active TBT member, volunteer and teacher before passing away at a young age.

### TOM THERIOT MEMORIAL PROGRAM FUND

This fund supports special dynamic programs, often related to the arts. It is named after Tom Theriot, a lover of the arts, who was a constant presence at TBT and supported every cause.

## Torah Portions for October 2019

*Summarized by Rabbi Dan Gordon*

### **November 1-2, 2019 Noah, Genesis 6:9-11:32**

Noah's story is about new beginnings. Noah, having been "righteous in his day" gains G-d's trust, and his family becomes the sole survivors of the Great Flood. The evil world is washed away, and Noah and his family were given the opportunity to rebuild and repopulate. In a new sign of things to come, G-d establishes a special relationship with mankind with a unique promise: to never again destroy the world. The multi-colored rainbow becomes the everlasting symbol of this promise. As the rainbow is both filled with color and mysteriously impossible to touch, we might contemplate our mysterious relationship with G-d that has many different facets. As the generations of Noah lead to Abraham, we establish the tradition of promises and covenantal relationships.

### **November 8-9, Lech L'Cha, Genesis 12:1-17:27**

G-d speaks to Abram for the first time, establishing both blessings and covenants. Abram shows his faith to G-d by leaving his home and following G-d's plan. It is unclear from the Torah why Abram was chosen, but *midrashic* stories hint about a special a special connection, with Abram believing in the one true G-d in a world of idol worshippers. To solidify a promise, G-d changes his name to Abraham, which means "father of many," and declares that he will be blessed by all nations, and will have a legacy of many offspring.

### **November 15-16, Vayeira, Genesis 18:1-22:24**

There are many tests in this Torah portion. Visitors come to see Abraham, and he welcomes them with extraordinary hospitality. Sarah and Abraham learn that, despite their advanced years, they will have a son together. G-d consults with Abraham about His plan to destroy Sodom and Gemorrah, and Abraham negotiates a plan to try to save the city. Later, Abraham is tested by being asked by G-d to sacrifice Isaac. Abraham is prepared to make this ultimate sacrifice before an angel of G-d stops him.

### **November 22-23, Chaya Sarah, Genesis 23:1-25:18**

Almost immediately after the near-death of her son, Sarah dies at 127 years old. Abraham wants to make sure she has an honorable burial. Though the landowner offers to give him burial land for free, Abraham insists on paying the full price. He then sends his servant to look for a wife for Isaac. Rebecca, a distant cousin, is chosen because her kindness to humans and animals indicates a unique sensitivity.

### **November 29-30, Toldot, Genesis 25:19-28:9**

The most volatile sibling rivalry since Cain and Abel begins with the twins, Esau and Jacob, battling in the womb. Mother Rebecca is told by G-d that the greater of the two shall serve the younger. Esau sells Jacob his birthright for some soup, and Jacob collects the blessing of the firstborn with Rebecca's help. Having built a brotherly relationship based on trickery, deceit and manipulation, Jacob and Esau realize that the town isn't big enough for both of them. Both brothers go to uncles. Jacob travels to Rebecca's father's house (where he will marry both of Laban's daughters), and Esau finds himself a wife from the daughters of uncle, Abraham's eldest son, Ishmael.
