RABBI'S MESSAGE

Rosh Hashanah to Yom Kippur and Back

Many people say they have lost track of time during the Covid-19 Pandemic. Is it Tuesday already? One of my rabbinic colleagues gave a label to this confusion about time: she called it O.T., standing for “oblivious time.” Sports fans will recognize the same acronym as “overtime.” Overtime is played when teams haven’t reached a conclusion by the end of the game. Oblivious Time is when we are unaware of what is happening or what is supposed to be happening. Time sometimes feels like our friend and other times like an adversary. When we are in school or at work and have a deadline to turn in an assignment or finish a project, it seems as if time is against us. Vacations end too soon, and weekends fly by. For taxpayers, April 15 creeps up on us. When we are with people we love, time runs out quickly. When we are in an uncomfortable situation, time drags on. Einstein quipped that his scientific “theory of relativity,” could be summed up by perspective: when the experience is pleasant, an hour can seem like a minute; when the experience is painful, a minute seems like an hour. Time can seem much too short or much too long, especially at the end of life. We don’t want to lose our loved ones, but when someone is suffering, we don’t want their pain to drag on.

Time is a gift to be cherished. We appreciate the time we spend experiencing life, enjoying nature, celebrating with loved ones, enriching our minds, enhancing the lives of others, and being enriched. The Jewish calendar gives us many ways to measure time. When the liturgy states, “On Rosh Hashanah it (the Book of Life) is written and on Yom Kippur it is sealed,” it can feel like a last-minute deadline. Let’s hurry up and do as many good deeds as we can in those ten days to ensure a good year. Quick! Before it’s too late! Let’s start “*mitzvah-ing!*” Even the liturgy suggests at the end of Yom Kippur that “the gates are closing,” and we need to make our final Yom Kippur prayers extra-sincere so they will be heard and answered.

I like to think of Yom Kippur as a reminder rather than a deadline. Not a rush to sudden action, but a reminder to always look for ways to improve ourselves and the world. Rabbi Harold Schulweis commented:

“The last word has not been spoken, the last sentence has not been written, the final verdict is not in. It’s never too late to change my mind, my direction, to say no to the past and yes to the future, to offer remorse, to ask and give forgiveness. It’s never too late to start over again, to feel again, to love again, to hope again...”

Every day we have the opportunity for *teshuva*, the concept of moving closer to the best we can be. Reminders, like Yom Kippur, make us accountable. While conceding our transgressions, we must also recognize our attributes. It’s a way to start over and build on our accomplishments. The “Days of Awe,” the ten days between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, are said to be of utmost importance; but it’s even more important to spend all those days between Yom Kippur and Rosh Hashanah fulfilling our truest potential and appreciating all the gifts of the world. Perhaps we can make these next months the “Days of Ahhhhhhhhh.” Then, we will have just enough time.

Torah Portions for October 2020

Summarized by Rabbi Dan Gordon

October 2-3, 2020 Special Reading for Sukkot, Leviticus 22:26-23:44

The Torah readings for Sukkot concern the marking of time and the sacrifices related to them. It includes a reminder about sacred places and making sure not to profane a sacred place or G-d's sacred name. It also reminds us about keeping the Sabbath holy and the special customs related to Passover, Shavuot and Sukkot. Much of the teaching is related to harvesting and acknowledging the importance of appreciation of the harvest. It is essential to remember the importance of gratitude. Observing the specific times of the year for different offerings helps us keep those priorities.

October 9-10, 2020 Simchat Torah

Ve-Zot Ha-B'racha, Deuteronomy 33:1-34:10 and Bereishit, Genesis 1:1-6:8

For our Simchat Torah celebration, we repeat the last lines of Deuteronomy and begin immediately with the first passages in Genesis. Torah is a never-ending learning process, so as soon as we finish, we begin again, searching for new insights. The end of Deuteronomy is Moses' love song to the nation of Israel and the gentle transition of leadership to Joshua. It includes Moses' closing speech, his death, his status as our greatest teacher, and acknowledgment of his special relationship with G-d. The opening chapters of Torah outline G-d's creation of the world day-by-day, and move into the struggles of the human family. These passages include commonly known stories; Adam and Eve eating the forbidden fruit, Cain's murder of his brother, Abel and the Tower of Babel, leading up to the time of Noah.

October 16-17, 2020 Bereishit, Genesis, 1:1-6:8

The Shabbat following Simchat Torah is a repeat of Genesis, as we begin the new cycle of Torah reading with the original stories of the first families of the world.

October 23-24, 2020 Noah, Genesis 6:9-11:32

Noah's story is also about new beginnings. Noah, having been "righteous in his day" gains G-d's trust, and his family becomes the sole survivors of the Great Flood. The evil world is washed away, and Noah and his family gave the opportunity to rebuild and repopulate. G-d makes everlasting promises to mankind. The rainbow tells us that G-d will never again destroy the world, and Noah's line will lead us to Abraham, with whom G-d will connect the eternal covenants.

October 30-31, 2020 Lech L'Cha, Genesis 12:1-17:27

G-d speaks to Abram for the first time, establishing both blessings and covenants. Abram shows his faith to G-d by leaving his home and following G-d's plan. It is unclear from the Torah why Abram was chosen, but *midrashic* stories hint the Abram had a special connection, believing in one G-d when others worshipped idols. In one popular midrash, young Abraham smashes idols in his father's shop to prove they are not gods. G-d changes his name to Abraham, which means "father of many," and promises that he will be blessed by all nations and will have a legacy of many offspring.

All donations to Temple Beth Torah are tax deductible. You can choose where you would like your donation to be applied.

GENERAL FUND

Any donation that is not specified to another specific fund goes to the General Fund, which helps maintain the operating budget of the temple. Building expenses, insurance, staff salaries and all program expenses that are not underwritten come out of the General Fund, as well as support for the Religious School.

RABBI'S DISCRETIONARY FUND

This separate tzedakah fund enables the rabbi to make confidential contributions to help individuals and causes that may be in crisis. The rabbi may also use this fund to help support unbudgeted programs that will benefit the temple or community.

BURT LEVY MEMORIAL LIBRARY FUND

This fund maintains the library and helps purchase new books. Our library, located in the back of the sanctuary, is named after TBT's founding president, Burt Levy, who was a major inspiration in starting Temple Beth Torah.

TRACY TOBIN JOHNSON MEMORIAL EDUCATION FUND

This fund provides scholarships to Jewish summer camps for children and for educational conferences for teachers. It also helps support special educational programs that are not in the general budget. The fund honors Tracy Tobin Johnson, who was an active TBT member, volunteer and teacher before passing away at a young age.

TOM THERIOT MEMORIAL PROGRAM FUND

This fund supports special dynamic programs, often related to the arts. It is named after Tom Theriot, a lover of the arts, who was a constant presence at TBT and supported every cause.
