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VIRTUAL HIGH HOLY DAYS SERVICES

Rabbi Dan Gordon and Cantor Vadim Tunitsky will lead virtual services for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. The services will be prerecorded and streamed at the appropriate times. TBT Members will be able to participate virtually by recording readings and greetings which will be incorporated into the service.

Members of Temple Beth Torah will be getting a link to the services via email the week before Rosh Hashanah. Any members who would like to do a reading during services should contact Shari Ellsworth at ritual@tbthumble.org by September 10th.

**Rabbi/Comedian Robert Haas
to Perform Virtually for Temple Beth Torah
Sunday, September 6, 7:30 PM**



Rabbi Robert Haas will give a special comedy program for Temple Beth Torah over Zoom. Rabbi Haas, a native of McAllen, Texas, was associate rabbi of Congregation Emanu El in Houston for four years before becoming senior rabbi Congregation Mickve Israel in Savannah Georgia. Rabbi Haas has always enjoyed using humor in his Shabbat and High Holiday sermons. A few years ago, when he was working on jokes to present at High Holidays, he was invited to do a stand-up comedy routine for a community fundraiser. “I decided I would go to an open mic to practice some of my sermon jokes,” he said. When he found people laughing with him even outside the synagogue, he decided to cultivate his act.

Rabbi Haas is no stranger to Jewish humor, having taught several adult education classes on the topic. He brings with him the tradition of old time “Borsht Belt” comedians along with laughter about modern times. “There is enough in our world that we must take seriously,” says the rabbi, who volunteered in Africa for American World Jewish Service before relocating to Georgia. “We need to take time out for laughter. It is a great way to keep our lives in balance and reduce stress. You know, the Psalms teach us, ‘He who sits in the heavens laughs.’” In 2013, Rabbi Haas was featured on a TED Talk entitled “Finding Happiness through Humor.” He has also been recognized for his work in building tolerance and understanding with interfaith groups in Savannah.

The Sunday evening performance is titled “Shalom Y’all Comedy,” and will include some teaching about the history of Jewish humor along with the comedy set. It is free and open to all. See the weekly email for the Zoom link, or by emailing admin@tbthumble.org.

RABBI'S MESSAGE

Your Home is your Sanctuary

“Let them make Me a sanctuary, that I may dwell among them” Exodus 25:8

The Torah focuses extensively on creating a *mishkan*, a dwelling place for the Ten Commandments, as well as the construction of the holy, sacred Temple in Jerusalem. It provides detail about size, structure, color, and ornamentation. The Hebrews carried the portable ark through the wilderness. Centuries later, King Solomon finished the actual building. But only the High Priests could enter the inner sanctuary. Others made pilgrimages three times a year to bring sacrifices, standing outside the inner walls while the Priests took the offerings to present to the Holy One. That was their way of worship.

When the Temple was destroyed, gradually, synagogues became houses of worship. Anyone could now find a building that housed a Torah, employed a rabbi, and had sacred literature to study. Today, there are thousands of synagogues all over the world. Some have daily worshippers, most fill up more on Shabbat, and on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, it can be standing room only.

Coming into a sanctuary gives us a sense of peace and community. But where is the heart of our connection to the Divine? In ancient times, there was an inner sanctuary that was only physically accessible to High Priests. Now, it becomes important to find our own inner connection. A building can provide a sense of atmosphere. But it is the inner heart of every person that makes the true sense of warmth.

Now is the time to find the spiritual connection inside; not inside a physical structure, but inside ourselves. The community will connect with the help of technology. But we must also find the way to create our own spiritual connection. Perhaps we can make the environment in our personal homes help ignite that spirit. For some, candles, artwork, and religious symbols could help decorate that environment, and feel like a personal sanctuary. For some, it might be the presence of family or friends in the same room, or even over a computer screen. Many will want to take some quiet time before or after the recorded service, contemplating the previous year and the next year, meditating on the hopes, dreams, expectations, and potential surprises the world offers. We take time to remember the blessings and the challenges, while trying to feel blessed by both. On Yom Kippur morning, we read:

“Surely this Teaching is not confusing or beyond your reach. It is not in the heavens, that you should say, ‘Who among us can go up to the heavens and get it for us and teach it to us?’ Neither is it beyond the sea, that you should say, ‘Who can cross to the other side of the sea and get it for us and teach it to us?’ No. This is very close to you, in your mouth and in your heart.” (Deuteronomy 31)

We have many blessings and many challenges. This year, we are challenged to truly make our home a sanctuary. Let us see the Divine before our eyes, in our homes, and in our hearts. Starting from such holy hearts, holy homes, and holy minds, together, we will make it a very sweet New Year.

Yom Kippur Afternoon Discussion Rabbi Jimmy Kessler – Life as a Texan Rabbi Yom Kippur Day Monday, September 28 1:00 PM

For many TBT participants, one of the highlights of Yom Kippur is the break between the morning and afternoon services. Some choose to relax and take a nap, while others have stayed at the temple to engage in discussion. We have had some fascinating guests who have inspired thoughtful discussion in the middle of the most prayerful and contemplative day. This year will be no exception. The live discussion will take place over Zoom at 1:00 P.M. after the morning service is concluded.

Rabbi Jimmy Kessler was born in Houston, and except for his years in rabbinical school in Cincinnati, has spent his whole life in Texas. He was the first director of Texas Hillel, serving college students at the University of Texas, and then served as rabbi of Congregation B'nai Israel in Galveston for thirty years before becoming Rabbi Emeritus in 2014. In 1980, he founded the Texas Jewish Historical Society. He is the author of three books, including *Ramblings of a Texan Rabbi*.

Rabbi Kessler is an engaging speaker and storyteller and will brighten our Yom Kippur afternoon.

Shabbat/Tashlich – A time of transition **Friday, September 25, 7 PM**

Between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur is a very special time. After inspirational worship on Rosh Hashanah, we focus our spiritual energy toward Yom Kippur, a time of being accountable for our past and our future. The sages called this time “*cheshbon ha-nefesh*” – an accounting of the soul. It is a time to contemplate a personal commitment to the coming year, while reflecting on the past year.

The usual tradition is to go to a flowing body of water and toss breadcrumbs into the water, symbolically “casting our sins” away. While zooming from our homes, Rabbi Dan will lead a unique, creative, and interactive experience on Shabbat as we connect our inner selves and each other during this contemplative time. Torah Portions for September 2020

Summarized by Rabbi Dan Gordon

September 4-5, 2020 Ki Tavo Deuteronomy 26:1-29:8

The *parshah* begins with a description of a ceremony to commemorate the occupation of the land. Some of every first fruit of the soil will be given to the Priest as the Exodus experience is retold. A tenth of the yield must be set-aside for the Levite, the stranger, the fatherless and the widow. Blessings and curses, some extremely graphic, are recited to motivate the people to observe the covenant.

September 11-12, 2020 Nitzavim/Va-Yelech Deuteronomy 29:9-31:30 (double portion)

Nitzavim is read twice a year: once on its calendar date and once on Yom Kippur. It is no mere recapitulation but instead is a talk about the future. Moses' speech to the Israelites just before they enter the Land of Israel reveals that in Judaism, belief flows from behavior. The actions – rituals as well as deeds of kindness – help inspire our faith. Moses reminds the Israelites that G-d's words, teachings and spirit are not meant to be distant, but are close to us, in our hearts. In *Vayelech* Moses announces to the Israelites that at one hundred and twenty years old, he is no longer active. He publicly transfers his authority to Joshua and empowers the Levites to bring the Teachings of the Torah into the Ark of Covenant. Moses warns the Israelites to remember all of G-d's commandments by re-reading the teachings even after his own death.

September 18-19, 2020 ROSH HASHANAH – B'reishit Genesis 1:1-2:4

The original story of the creation of the world in six days, with G-d resting on the seventh day.

September 25-26, 2020 Ha'Azinu Deuteronomy 32:1-52

Moses, nearing the end of his life, uses poetry and song to recount the journey in the desert. At the conclusion of the song, G-d instructs Moses to climb to the top of Mount Nebo, overlooking the Jordan River. This is where Moses will die, able to see the Promised Land, but not enter it. G-d explains this is because Moses broke faith with Him when he struck the rock. Moses is 120 years old.

DONATIONS

GENERAL FUND

Any donation that is not specified to another specific fund goes to the General Fund, which helps maintain the operating budget of the temple. Building expenses, insurance, staff salaries and all program expenses that are not underwritten come out of the General Fund, as well as support for the Religious School.

RABBI'S DISCRETIONARY FUND

This separate tzedakah fund enables the rabbi to make confidential contributions to help individuals and causes that may be in crisis. The rabbi may also use this fund to help support unbudgeted programs that will benefit the temple or community.

BURT LEVY MEMORIAL LIBRARY FUND

This fund maintains the library and helps purchase new books. Our library, located in the back of the sanctuary, is named after TBT's founding president, Burt Levy, who was a major inspiration in starting Temple Beth Torah.

TRACY TOBIN JOHNSON MEMORIAL EDUCATION FUND

This fund provides scholarships to Jewish summer camps for children and for educational conferences for teachers. It also helps support special educational programs that are not in the general budget. The fund honors Tracy Tobin Johnson, who was an active TBT member, volunteer and teacher before passing away at a young age.

TOM THERIOT MEMORIAL PROGRAM FUND

This fund supports special dynamic programs, often related to the arts. It is named after Tom Theriot, a lover of the arts, who was a constant presence at TBT and supported every cause.
