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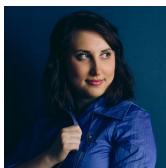
Celebrate Shabbat Virtually

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE:

Baking Challah and What It Can Teach...

I had the opportunity to make a challah from scratch recently. This is something I have always wanted to do. There is something special about eating this warm, light, flavor filled bread that makes Shabbat so special.

Making challah takes time and until recently, I chose to go to HEB or the Great Harvest Bread Company in Kingwood and purchase one rather than make one. For my first attempt, I chose a simple recipe: "Challah in a bag," It sounded foolproof, or so I thought.

It starts with a Ziplock one gallon bag. Add yeast, water, sugar, salt, and oil followed by flour, and then all you do is "give it all a little shake." I then placed the bag with its contents in a bowl of warm water for 30 minutes as the instructions said and gave it another "shake." I let it sit on the table for an hour, flipping the bag every 20 minutes. Sounds easy, I thought. I cut the dough into 3 pieces and made a beautiful braid, basted the loaf with an egg bath and sprinkled sesame seeds on the finished product. So far, so good. It then went into the oven for 40 minutes and I was done.

My finished product looked beautiful but was as dense as a brick. Lynn, trying to be kind, said after eating a slice slowly during our Shabbat dinner, that "it was growing on her."

It is said that "baking challah brings blessings upon the home and helps transform the physical to the spiritual" – this is one of our main jobs in the world. Each challah, like each of us, is unique. "Just as we are a mixture of nature and nurture, so too is the finished challah a mixture of the measured ingredients and the care those ingredients received." I found that the "brick" of challah I made to eat is clearly a metaphor of life. As in life, "the more times you do something and the more attention you pay to what you are doing, the finished product will be better." First attempts (at anything) can be hard, tough, dense and difficult to chew. Trying something new can be a challenge, but ease comes with practice and encouragement.

Making the challah also reminded me of my mother. She was an amazing cook and baker and I can still taste the delicious challah she would make seemingly without any effort. It will be 20 years this month since her passing and I can still smell the sweetness in the air of her challah baking in the oven.

I found out that my sister has my mother's challah recipe—it may be a little more complicated than my "challah in a bag." I will try again...because that's what life is all about.

RABBI'S MESSAGE

What a Difference a Year Makes

A year ago, at this time, life was very different for all of us. Personally, I was making arrangements to attend a rabbinic conference in New York. I had no qualms about flying and all the restaurants were open. At the conference, nobody was wearing masks, we sat close to each other and affectionately embraced our colleagues. As I flew back to Houston on February 15, 2020, I had no idea what the coming months had in store.

The Hebrew calendar starts with the month of Nissan, the month that includes Passover. When the Coronavirus became a reality a few weeks before Pesach, we scrambled to learn how to maintain our joyous community when we were separated physically. The “zoom” format was an uncomfortable solution for many, but we made it work. We all thought it was a temporary solution; it still IS temporary but has lasted much longer than anticipated.

Adjusting to a different reality is nothing new for the Jewish people. As I think back just a few months ago to the process of hosting, in virtual technology, a Passover seder, an Open House, weekly religious school classes, adult education and High Holiday worship, I'm reminded of when our ancestors were rushed out of Egypt. The Pandemic that arrived a year ago forced us to explore new avenues of learning and worship, just as the sudden redemption from Egypt forced us to explore a forty-year wilderness in search of a Promised Land.

It hasn't been an easy adjustment, but we continue to explore the best ways to stay safe and communicate. The desert wilderness was filled with challenges. It included the mysteries of available food and water, as well as fears about safety and uncertainty about how long the journey would last. Our society is experiencing many of those same mysteries. Countless people have gotten sick; many have recovered fully, some still experience symptoms while others, sadly, have died. A vaccine is here! And with it, the uncertainty of how long it will take before enough people are safe from the virus.

Like our biblical ancestors, we maintain our hopes, regardless of how uncertain the path. Our prayers are not empty, because they are accompanied by actions: increased hygienic practices, masking, and making sure we and our loved ones remain safe while embracing what medical science provides. In our desert journey G-d gave us manna to eat, helped Miriam find water and guided Moses on the path to freedom. Moses could not lead if we did not follow the paths and learn from G-d's instructions. Today, we rely on the wisdom of science to help us learn what we need to do...and then we need to do it! We have already shown that we can, and we will remain strong as a community, whatever challenges are in front of us.

And we continue, moving forever forward...

Dr. Scott Eric Kaufman was an amazing young man who touched the lives of so many people. He was an educator who was so respected by his students and colleagues. Scott loved using technology and found innovative ways as a college professor to teach his students.

Unfortunately, Scott was taken away from us too soon, passing away at the young age of 39. However, he influenced countless people through his university teaching and later as an editor of an online literary magazine. Scott was a pioneer in academic blogging when the academic powers that be did not think it was a productive form of discourse.

Scott's parents, Alice and Jeff Kaufman, have chosen to keep his memory alive with tzedakah, and are making a donation to Temple Beth Torah to start a fund to help with technological needs at TBT. The education committee is evaluating the religious school and building needs and will be making a formal presentation at the synagogue's next board meeting this month.

Items being considered include updating the computers and screens in our classrooms so our teachers will have better options for using technology in helping teach our children. Also being evaluated is the need to replace outdated computers of our principal and rabbi and standardizing and updating our printers.

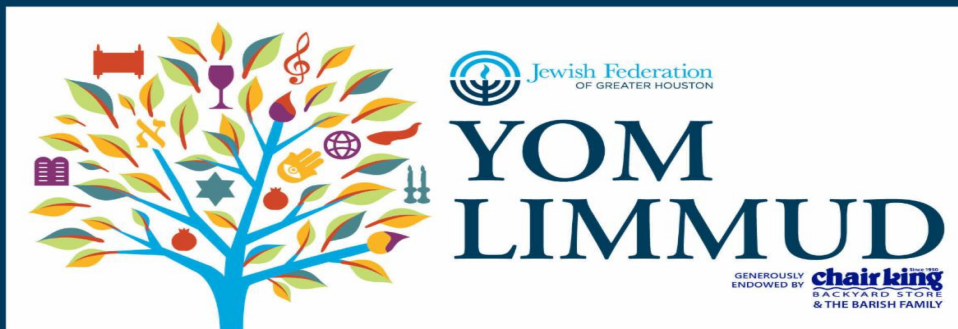

IMPORTANT NOTE FROM JEWISH FAMILY SERVICE

Jewish Family Service (JFS) of Houston has many ways to help members of the Jewish community. One of them is a chaplaincy department within Texas Medical Center in Houston. In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, hospital visitation policies changed to protect the staff and patients from possible exposure. Currently, most hospitals still are not allowing patients to bring a caregiver or family member into the hospital for their appointments or to visit inpatients in their hospital rooms. These changes have made it more difficult at times for patients, families, caregivers, and clergy to connect with Jewish chaplaincy services. If you or a family member become hospitalized, PLEASE let us know, either through admin@tbthumble.org or by contacting Rabbi Gordon directly by email or cell phone. Intake time at the hospital can be quite stressful and involved, but it will be helpful if you remember to identify your religious preference as "Jewish" and say "yes" to the section that asks if you would like to be contacted by a chaplain from your faith group. Also, tell your caregiver (doctor, nurse, social worker or case manager) that you would like to be contacted by a Jewish chaplain and share with the staff chaplain on duty that you would like to connect with a Jewish chaplain. If you give her permission, the Jewish chaplain will also be in contact with Rabbi Gordon. The Jewish chaplain for JFS is Hope Lipnick, who has been to TBT several times and works closely with Rabbi Gordon.

Torah Portions for February 2021

Summarized by Rabbi Dan Gordon

Beshalach Exodus 13:17-17:16 February 5-6, 2021

Finally set free by the Pharaoh, the Israelites depart from Egypt, only to be pursued by the ambivalent Pharaoh. God instructs Moses to lift his staff, and the Sea of Reeds parts for the Israelites to walk through on dry land. When Moses and the Israelites see the Egyptians drown in the Reed Sea, they sing a song of praise to God. Bitter reality of their journey causes them to complain to Moses their leader. In response, God sends manna to appease their hunger.

Yitro Exodus 18:1-20:23 February 12-13, 2021

Yitro, the portion named for Moses' father-in-law, begins with the Midianite priest's stunning confession that "the Lord is greater than all gods." Wise Jethro sees that Moses is taking too much on his own shoulders, and counsels his son-in-law to delegate his authority. The Ten Commandments are given by God in *Yitro*, amidst thunder and lightning, through Moses' voice. These commandments begin our relationship as a people with a special covenant with God that includes special responsibilities. They are not referred to as "Ten Commandments" at this point, and later called in Hebrew "*Aseret Dibrot*," or "Ten Words/Utterances." How the ten are divided differs between Judaism and Christianity, as well as within some Christian denominations.

Mishpatim Exodus 21:1-24:18 February 19-20, 2021

"*Mishpatim*" means "rules," "laws" or "ordinances," and seems disorganized to the modern reader because the rules were meant to be remembered through hearing rather than reading. Both ritual and ethical laws are given in *Mishpatim*. Some of the most important laws concern ethical treatment for the stranger, the widow and the orphan. The first laws given after the Ten Commandments include treatment of slaves. While we were not forbidden to have slaves, we were commanded to treat them in a certain manner, which included offering freedom after seven years. It is a valuable lesson to remember, since we had just come out of slavery. Sometimes, we are expected to do the opposite of the examples of what we've observed from our experiences. In this case, we're expected to treat servants how we would have liked to have been treated, rather than how we *were* treated.

Terumah, Exodus 25:1-27:19 February 26-27, 2021

We receive an elaborate description of how the Tabernacle is to be constructed, from the kind of wood used to the fabric for the drapes. Even though the construction is described in very elegant terms, we are encouraged only to make offerings from our hearts. A center piece in the Tabernacle will be the seven-branched menorah, which will be kept lit in an eternal light, signifying God's constant presence.
