RABBI'S MESSAGE

Transitions

The High Holy Days are a perfect time to think about transitions. Beyond moving from one year to the next, we experience a variety of transitions. It is a new school year, a new season, and an opportunity to begin all things anew. The cyclical nature of our calendar means that endings and beginnings merge with each other. We blend the joy of newness with memories of the past. On Simchat Torah, we finish reading the last lines of Deuteronomy, knowing that immediately follows the story of creation in Genesis that brings us full circle.

Both minor and major transitions affect us in different ways. The seasons change predictably, but sometimes severe weather causes important adjustments to life. Changing jobs, developing new relationships, shifting family structures, moving into a new home, etc.; every life event stimulates new experiences and responses. Rosh Hashana encourages us to remember how fresh beginnings can motivate our dedication to re-creating our personal world and the world around us, enhancing how we embrace life and the people in our lives. Each year, we grow older. For the young, that growth often involves increased vigor and responsibility. The transitions from childhood to adolescence to adulthood are filled with learning how to make a unique contribution to the world. For elders, the growth can inspire a different awareness. Aging encourages us to look back on life's accomplishments and experiences, while being mindful of new limitations. Maturity adds to our wisdom, but sometimes also diminishes our bodily strength. The challenge of managing change is a big part of growing from year to year.

Yom Kippur includes *Yizkor*, when we remember those who have who have transitioned into *Olam Ha-Ba*, the world to come. It is a time to consider the impact dear ones have had on our lives, and what impact we can make in the coming year. A new year is an exciting moment to embrace challenges and opportunities of personal growth and development at every age.

Rabbi Dr. Abraham Twerski, (1930-2021), who died from COVID-19 last year, was a Hasidic rabbi and also psychiatrist who specialized in treating addictions and chemical dependency. He wrote dozens of scholarly guides, most of which connected Jewish teachings with managing everyday challenges. Several of his books utilized characters from Charles Schultz' *Peanuts* to help teach important lessons. I remember seeing a cartoon of Charlie Brown and Snoopy sitting on a dock. Charlie Brown says to his dog, "We only live once, Snoopy." Snoopy's thought balloon responds, "Wrong! We only die once. We *live* every day!"

A New Year reminds us that each day is precious; a time to welcome the growth and opportunities that come with change.

Transitions can be subtle or dramatic. Together, let's move into the New Year with an excitement for all our new prospects.

The Jewish Federation of Greater Houston Announces Alfred "Al" Tribble, Jr. to serve as first Houston Community Security Director

Thanks to the generosity of Joan and Stanford Alexander, the Federation was able to launch Houston's Jewish Community Security Program and hire our first Community Security Director,

Alfred "Al" Tribble, Jr.

The Federation's partner in this work is the Secure Community Network (SCN). Established in 2004 under the auspices of the Jewish Federations of North America and the Conference of Presidents of Major Jewish Organizations, SCN is the official safety and security organization of the Jewish community in North America.

Because the Houston Federation's security program is powered by SCN, the Federation will also have access to SCN's national security advisors, intelligence analysts, and other professionals, in addition to benefiting from SCN's National Jewish Security Operations Command Center in Chicago. Al will be employed by SCN, and report to both SCN Regional Director David Humble in Phoenix and Houston Federation CEO Renée Wizig-Barrios.

Al brings a wealth of experience to the position of Community Security Director and will act as an expert security advisor, liaison, and training coordinator for the community. Under his direction, security practices will be enacted including, but not limited to: trainings for schools, synagogues, and other Jewish institutions; security consultations and threat assessments of our Jewish institutions; and on-hand community liaison with law enforcement for emergency events that may occur.

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL CORNER

Temple Beth Torah is off to a great start! We had an exciting first day of Religious School on August 28. We are so pleased to have excellent classroom teachers and Rabbi Dan to work with your children. We have two new teachers this year. Shayna Ellsworth is teaching our youngest students. Craig Lira-Waguespack is teaching the 7th-8th graders focusing on Hebrew instruction. Returning this year is Mike Miller working with 6th-7th grade and Andrea Miller, who is teaching 3rd-5th grade and coordinating our Hebrew program.

Our Religious School theme for the year is kehilla, coming together in a community. We share a desire to create a safe, peaceful and caring environment- our second home- that gives us a sense of belonging. Our students and families can create community by coming together to worship, sing and pray. Celebrating Shabbat at home on Zoom or with others at TBT brings us together. Torah Portions for September 2022

Summarized by Rabbi Dan Gordon

September 2-3, 2022, Shoftim, Deuteronomy 16:18-21:9

Bribery is forbidden and honesty is valued overall. Other governmental layers are described, including priests and even, eventually, kings. Kings must not be tempted by too much money or too many wives. The king must always keep a Torah with him, reminding him that God is the ultimate authority. Refuge cities are set up for those who kill accidentally. The death penalty is for malicious murder, but only with the collaboration of two or three witnesses; one witness is not sufficient. In the case of an unsolved murder, the priests are to pray for atonement for the whole city. We are instructed to appoint judges, and to make sure the judges are fair with all their decisions.

September 9-10, 2022, Ki Tetze Deuteronomy 21:10-25:19

There are seventy-two commandments in *Ki Tetze*, the largest number in any Torah portion. Topics covered include marriage and divorce, defiant children, fair weights and measures and charity for the poor. At the end of the *parsha* we are instructed to "blot out the memory of Amalek from under heaven." Many of the regulations teach us about righteous living. Others, such as how to handle a defiant child, convey problematic approaches that must be studied in the context of time, and perhaps should be read metaphorically.

September 16-17, 2022, Ki Tavo Deuteronomy 26:1-29:8

The *parshah* begins with a description of a ceremony to commemorate the occupation of the land. Some of every first fruit of the soil will be given to the priest as the exodus experience is retold. A tenth of the yield must be set-aside for the Levite, the stranger, the fatherless and the widow. Blessings and curses, some extremely graphic, are recited to motivate the people to observe the covenant.

September 23-24, 2022, Nitzavim Deuteronomy 29:9-30:20

Nitzavim is read twice a year: once on its calendar date and once on Yom Kippur. It is no mere recapitulation but instead is a talk about the future. Moses' speech to the Israelites just before they enter the Land of Israel reveals that in Judaism, belief flows from behavior. The actions – rituals as well as deeds of kindness – help inspire our faith. Moses reminds the Israelites that G-d's words, teachings and spirit are not meant to be distant, but are close to us, in our hearts.
