# RABBI'S MESSAGE

## *Of Thanks and Giving*

Every November, when I sit down to write my monthly message, I think about gratitude. After all, November is the month of Thanksgiving, which President Lincoln declared as a national holiday in 1863. As children, most of us learned about “the first Thanksgiving” as a sharing between Native Americans and the early Pilgrims. While some of the notions of gatherings in the 1600’s may be exaggerated, the concept of giving thanks for our abundance has endured. By the time President Lincoln gave it official prominence in the United States, his suggestions were not about the bountiful meal that has become the primary symbol of Thanksgiving, but about appreciation toward the Almighty and sensitivity to the less fortunate. Lincoln’s proclamation, in the midst of great political controversies, included a desire to unify a country divided by war and ideology. Lincoln said (edited for brevity):

*“I...invite my fellow citizens...to observe the last Thursday of November...as a day of Thanksgiving and Praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the Heavens. And I recommend to them that while offering up... blessings, they do also...commend to His tender care all those who have become widows, orphans, mourners, or sufferers”.*

This is obviously not about a turkey dinner or even pre-holiday sales. As Thanksgiving has evolved over the generations, we can continue to focus on making gratitude a spotlight. It’s not as easy as a singular prayer before a Thursday gathering and a long weekend. Living with gratitude can be a challenge. It’s easy to be grateful when things are going the way we expect, but much harder when difficulties get in our way. Mussar is a Jewish spiritual practice of discipline that gives concrete instructions on how to live a meaningful and ethical life. 11<sup>th</sup> Century scholar, Rabbi ibn Pakuda, teaches in his Mussar classic Duties of the Heart, that there are three barriers that keep us from being grateful:

1. We become overly occupied with material things that we don’t have without appreciating what we already have. [this is reminiscent of the teaching from Pirke Avot: “Who is rich? Those who are happy with their lot.]
2. We take things for granted, without appreciating everyday blessings.
3. We focus on the negative, and let little things bother us without recognizing the many positive things in our lives.

Robert Emmons, a professor of psychology, notes that “people who practice gratitude are viewed as more helpful, more outgoing, more optimistic, and more trustworthy.” Perhaps the Thanksgiving message can be more about what we can offer the world than what the world provides for us. An ancient Sufi folk tale describes a woman who approaches a sage, saying she has so many troubles she doesn’t know how she can go on. The sage enthusiastically tells her that he has found the recipe for a potion that can remove all her troubles. He is just missing one ingredient: a mustard seed from a house that has seen no sorrow. He sends the woman on her mission to find that mustard seed; but, alas, while many homes can offer the ingredient, none can admit they have not seen sorrow. The woman hears many stories. At the last home she visits, she hears such a tale that she chooses to remain with the family and help them. In doing so, together, their sorrows are diminished.

As we celebrate a Thanksgiving to appreciate our many gifts, it is a good time to contemplate the special gifts each of us has that can help make the world a better place.

Later Saturday afternoon and Saturday night, the festival continues with workshops and a storytelling concert. **Holocaust Garden of Hope Taking Shape in  
Kingwood  
Groundbreaking  
November 14, 2-3 PM  
Kings Harbor Waterfront**

After five years of planning, construction is beginning for a Holocaust Garden of Hope right in our neighborhood. This is an open-air museum commemorating victims and survivors of the Holocaust, as well as rescuers who risked their own lives to help the oppressed Jewish people in Nazi Germany. This project is coordinated by the Holocaust Remembrance Association (HRA), an interfaith organization devoted to education, healing, and reconciliation. As stated by HRA *"The purpose of the Holocaust Garden of Hope is to grow beauty from ashes and to let people know that such atrocities that happened during World War II and the whole of the Holocaust didn't have to happen if good people would have chosen to not be silent."*

The groundbreaking ceremony will include music and light refreshments. It will take place at 4501 Magnolia Cove Dr. in Kingwood, on the green between Raffa's and Sharky's restaurants. Free parking is available in the garage. More information can be found at [www.hra18.org](http://www.hra18.org)

**Synagogues in Action Against Antisemitism  
TBT is part of the ADL's Kulanu Program**

Temple Beth Torah has been selected with over 100 synagogues nationwide and ten other Houston synagogues to participate in a program called Kulanu, which is Hebrew for "all of us." Organized by the Anti-Defamation League (ADL), Kulanu is dedicated to empowering congregations to address antisemitism and hate in the local communities through education, community engagement and advocacy. The program includes interactive webinars and guidance for our own community to develop programs that build bridges of understanding. A pilot program with 18 synagogues began before ADL launched this large and ambitious initiative. A rabbi in Colorado who participated in the pilot program said, "We learned that by educating those who are also hurting from bigotry and helping them to better understand Judaism, we welcome them into our universe as friends and allies."

The Texas congregations are being coordinated by ADL staff member Lisa Stone, who recently led an educational program for TBT called "Words in Action."

## Torah Portions for November 2022

*Summarized by Rabbi Dan Gordon*

### November 4-5, 2022, Lech L'Cha, Genesis 12:1-17:27

G-d speaks to Abram for the first time, establishing both blessings and covenants. Abram shows his faith to G-d by leaving his home and following G-d's plan. It is unclear from the Torah why Abram was chosen, but *midrashic* stories hint the Abram had a special connection, believing in one G-d when others worshipped idols. In one popular midrash, young Abraham smashes idols in his father's shop to prove they are not gods. G-d changes his name to Abraham, which means "father of many," and promises that he will be blessed by all nations and will have a legacy of many offspring.

### November 11-12, 2022, Vayeira, Genesis 18:1-22:24

There are many tests in this Torah portion. Visitors come to see Abraham, and he welcomes them with extraordinary hospitality. Sarah and Abraham learn that, despite their advanced years, they will have a son together. Sarah laughs at the possibility, leading to the child being named Isaac ("she will laugh). G-d consults with Abraham about His plan to destroy Sodom and Gemorrah, and Abraham negotiates a plan to try to save the city. Later, Abraham is tested by being asked by G-d to sacrifice Isaac. Abraham is prepared to make this ultimate sacrifice before an angel of G-d stops him, and a ram is sacrificed instead of his son.

### November 18-19, 2022, Chaya Sarah, Genesis 23:1-25:18

Almost immediately after the near-death of her son, Sarah dies at 127 years old. Abraham wants to make sure she has an honorable burial. Though the landowner offers to give him burial land for free, Abraham insists on paying the full price. He then sends his servant to look for a wife for Isaac. Rebecca, a distant cousin, is chosen because her kindness to humans and animals indicates a unique sensitivity.

### November 25-26, 2022, Toldot, Genesis 25:19-28:9

The most volatile sibling rivalry since Cain and Abel begins with the twins, Esau and Jacob, battling in the womb. Mother Rebecca is told by G-d that the greater of the two shall serve the younger. Esau sells Jacob his birthright for some soup, and Jacob collects the blessing of the firstborn with Rebecca's help. Having built a brotherly relationship based on trickery, deceit and manipulation, Jacob and Esau realize that the town isn't big enough for both of them. Both brothers go to uncles. Jacob travels to Rebecca's father's house (where he will marry both of Laban's daughters), and Esau finds himself a wife from the daughters of Uncle Ishmael.

# Temple Beth Torah Donate a Brick Campaign

TBT member Will Pollard has built a brick path in front of our Sukkah as part of his Eagle Scout project. We are now giving everyone an opportunity to donate an engraved brick for the path with **all donations going to support Temple Beth Torah!**

This is a wonderful way to remember a loved one or honor a friend/family member. You can also use it to commemorate an occasion, like a bar/bat mitzvah, a wedding, an anniversary or a memorable birthday.

Each brick can be inscribed with 3 lines and 20 characters per line (letters, numbers, spaces, punctuation and other keyboard symbols are considered characters).

Various approved clip art designs can be made available for an additional \$20 donation per brick. If clip art is used, the text is limited to 15 characters per line.

## Brick donations are:

**1 Brick= \$100**

**2 Bricks= \$180 @ \$90/each**

**3 Bricks= \$240 @ \$80/each**
