Kolatch's books give simple answers to hundreds of questions about Jewish ritual, holidays, practices, and customs with a technical scholarly perspective.

When TBT gathers, we discuss some of these questions, but also focus on many of the philosophical issues that are part of the Jewish world today as well as our own community. It is a personal way for us to learn from each other. Participants pose their questions anonymously, by placing written questions in a "hat." Rabbi Dan's philosophy is that there is often a variety of possible reasons why Jews do what Jews do! He will offer his perspective about what's on your mind, and others will be able to discuss other possibilities. In the classic Jewish way, we will learn from each other!

There will be a movie for the kids in the Children's Classroom, while the adults are having their discuusion.

RABBI'S MESSAGE

Branching Out with Growth

Whether by divine design or curious coincidence, the Jewish calendar gives us multiple opportunities to explore spiritual growth. After the darkness of winter is brightened by the sparks of the Hanukkah lights, there is a brief pause in Jewish holiday observances. We are currently in the month of Shevat, which includes the holiday of Tu Beshevat, also known as the Birthday of Trees, or Jewish Arbor Day. The progression of each month builds with different personalities. Shevat leads to Adar, the month with the joyous merriment of Purim; Adar leads to Nisan, and the freedom celebration of Passover.

We often think of Jewish holidays with historical importance, but for us to truly connect with the concepts, we must find a modern significance. Tu Beshevat, a celebration of trees, has great magnitude for the agricultural society of the past. The Torah actually forbids destroying trees in war: *"When you capture a city, you must not destroy its trees. You may eat from them, but do not cut them down." (Deuteronomy 20:19)* Even in more modern history, with the establishment of the state of Israel, observing Tu Beshevat includes rebuilding the desert Jewish homeland to fill it with green growth. When I was a child, every year there would be a "tree drive" in which we would collect dimes on a card until we reached enough coins to plant a tree. We were taught the desert needed to be replenished to ensure Israel's survival. But Israel is now 75 years old, and has become a modern country, leading the world in technological advances. What enhanced role can Tu Beshevat have in the modern world?

While remembering the importance of trees, this is a good time to also look philosophically at both what trees provide in the physical world and what lessons we can derive. Physically, of course, trees have great value. Cultivated efficiently, trees provide us with wood for shelter, paper for learning and oxygen for breathing. There are many reasons that trees are absolutely necessary for our very existence. But this season is also a good time to contemplate other aspects of growth. A famous story from the Talmud describes a sage named Honi who sees an elderly man planting a carob tree, which would take 70 years to bear fruit. Honi asks the man "*Why plant this tree when you will never see the fruits of your labors?*" The man responds by saying, "*There were trees in this world when I was born. I plant for the future generations.*"

The seeds we plant and the growth we experience are not just about trees. We plant seeds of understanding and wisdom, knowledge and ideas. Just as the tree needs water, space and fertilizer in order to thrive, a community needs nurturing to reach its potential. When we set an example for others by encouraging thoughtful discussion, we provide that nourishment. When we inspire each other to utilize our resources to enhance the world, that is also nourishment. We can reach out and stretch our metaphorical branches to include a wide variety of individuals and ideas. Sometimes, our branches provide shade and comfort; other times, seeds that are planted by our own fruit could inspire surprising innovations. The Jewish calendar gives us Tu Beshevat to honor trees. Let us also allow ourselves to think about how we can develop our own individual growth to create a beautiful and thriving forest.

Torah Portions for February 2023

Summarized by Rabbi Dan Gordon

February 3-4, 2023,

Beshalach Exodus 13:17-17:16

Finally set free by the Pharaoh, the Israelites depart from Egypt, only to be pursued by the ambivalent Pharaoh. God instructs Moses to lift his staff, and the Sea of Reeds parts for the Israelites to walk through on dry land. When Moses and the Israelites see the Egyptians drown in the Reed Sea, they sing a song of praise to God. Bitter reality of their journey causes them to complain to Moses their leader. In response, God sends manna to appease their hunger.

February 10-11, 2023, Yitro Exodus 18:1-20:23

Yitro, the portion named for Moses' father-in-law, begins with the Midianite priest's stunning confession that "the Lord is greater than all gods." Wise Jethro sees that Moses is taking too much on his own shoulders, and counsels his son-in-law to delegate his authority. The Ten Commandments are given by God in Yitro, amidst thunder and lightning, through Moses' voice. These commandments begin our relationship as a people with a special covenant with God that includes special responsibilities. They are not referred to as "Ten Commandments" at this point, and later called in Hebrew "Aseret Dibrot," or "Ten Words/Utterances." How the ten are divided differs between Judaism and Christianity, as well as within some Christian denominations.

February 17-18, 2023, Mishpatim Exodus 21:1-24:18

"Mishpatim" means "rules," "laws" or "ordinances," and seems disorganized to the modern reader because the rules were meant to be remembered through hearing rather than reading. Both ritual and ethical laws are given in Mishpatim. Some of the most important laws concern ethical treatment for the stranger, the widow and the orphan. The first laws given after the Ten Commandments include treatment of slaves. While we were not forbidden to have slaves, we were commanded to treat them in a certain manner, which included offering freedom after seven years. It is a valuable lesson to remember, since we had just come out of slavery. Sometimes, we are expected to do the opposite of the examples of what we've observed from our experiences. In this case, we're expected to treat servants how we would have liked to have been treated, rather than how we were treated.

February 24-25, 2023, Terumah, Exodus 25:1-27:19

We receive an elaborate description of how the Tabernacle is to be constructed, from the kind of wood used to the fabric for the drapes. Even though the construction is described in very elegant terms, we are encouraged only to make offerings from our hearts. A center piece in the Tabernacle will be the sevenbranched menorah, which will be kept lit in an eternal light, signifying God's constant presence.

GENERAL FUND
