RABBI'S MESSAGE

It's Okay to Celebrate

(even when things aren't perfect)

“How is this Purim different from other Purim's?” Yes, I know that is more of a Passover question than one for Purim. Springtime brings with it a second “holiday season” (or third, if you count Hanukkah) for the Jewish calendar. The High Holidays start with Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur as we progress into Sukkot and Simchat Torah. This segment starts with contemplative prayer that leads to festive celebrations, like Simchat Torah. The winter holiday of Tu B'shevat leads us to a reverse order: festive celebrations, like Purim, leading to the more serious stories of the Exodus with Passover and receiving the Ten Commandments with Shavuot. Make no mistake, Purim provides the most raucous merriment of all the Jewish holidays.

For many years, I've contemplated my relationship with Purim and the Book of Esther. I want children and adults to embrace the joy of being Jewish and have a wonderful time with costumes, games, food, noisemaking and even a little craziness. Purim memories can remind us that Judaism is multifaceted jamboree that includes both merriment and spiritual, philosophical, and intellectual pursuits. In years past, I've allowed myself to have fun and even lead the revelry, while keeping in mind some of the harsh aspects of the Purim story that I find troubling.

Not this year. This year, with my Purim message, I am going to forgo my usual criticism of turning the violence of the Book of Esther into a victory party that celebrates the death of others. I'm not going to write about my disapproval of the vengeful actions that the Megillah seems to authorize with a rationalization of “well, they started it.” I'm not going to even compare these actions with Abraham's challenge to G-d about the destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah when he asks, “Will You sweep away the innocent along with the guilty?” (Genesis 18:23) Nor am I going to criticize Esther's use of trickery and deception that, for much of the book, allowed her to deny her heritage for political reasons rather than always showing pride in her Jewish identity. This year, I'm going to let all of that slide.

Now don't get me wrong. I'm still not ready to justify the revenge recipe that happens at the end of the Book of Esther. I'm not going to endorse murdering all of Haman's relatives despite the lack of evidence that they were involved in the plot to destroy the Jews. I'm not going to dwell on a disproportionate response of our Hebrew ancestors preemptively killing tens of thousands of Persians who never actually acted on Haman's aborted plot. I won't even compare the celebration of the demise of others (many of them innocent) in the Purim story to the different *Midrashic* response when G-d reproached the angels for dancing when the Egyptian soldiers drowned in the Sea, saying, “Are not these My children, too?” (giving us the tradition of diminishing our second cup of wine in the Passover seder in sympathy for the suffering of others.) I'm just not going to dwell on the negative.

This year, after all our struggles through Covid, striving to rebuild community after so much time being separated from public spaces, we've earned the right to have untainted festivity without diluting our joy with the philosophical, moral question of “should we really be celebrating when so many were killed at the hands of our ancestors?” After seeing antisemitism increasing throughout the world and the fear of threats, at times, diluting our ability to enjoy our Jewish worship and fellowship, perhaps we've earned a respite from digging deeply into the Purim story's troubling aspects. This year, let's party on and celebrate that we are still here, thriving as a people, able to continue to build our community and rejoice in our success stories.

We can go back to the intellectual, philosophical and moral implications next year. For now, let's party on! *Hag Purim Samayach! (Happy Purim!)*

Torah Portions for March 2023

Summarized by Rabbi Dan Gordon

March 3-4, 2023 Tetzaveh Exodus 27:20-30:10

This Torah portion describes the elaborate procedure involved in ordaining the priestly family, Aaron's descendants, who will be known as "Kohanim." Their clothes and their lives distinguish them as servants of both G-d and the people. They must take their roles extremely seriously, as they represent their sacred rituals will represent the Israelites to G-d. The portion begins with instructions for the "ner tamid" or Eternal Light, that reminds both of G-d's everlasting presence and our eternal relationship and devotion.

March 10-11, 2023 Ki Tissa Exodus 30:11-34:35

This is one of the most dramatic Torah portions, which includes the Israelites losing faith and building a Golden Calf to worship. Moses pleads with G-d to show mercy, and then his own anger causes him to break the tablets. Those who are not willing to come back to the LORD are killed. But the Torah portion includes reconciliation, as G-d instructs Moses to construct a new set of tablets "like the first." The first set were written by G-d; the second by Moses, empowering a human, and in turn, humanity, to maintain the commitment and the covenant.

March 17-18, 2023 Vayakhel/Pekude Exodus 35:1-40:38

This double portion brings us to the end of Exodus. Vayakhel describes the specifics of the wood and other items required in building the tabernacle. But it begins with a reprise of the commandment to rest on Shabbat. This teaches us that, even a highly important task like the tabernacle is not more important than our weekly day devoted to rest and rejuvenation. "Pekude" means "records" and refers to the accounting of the gold, silver, copper and yarn that were used to make the Tabernacle. In this last portion of Exodus, the presence of the Lord fills the Tabernacle. Traditional rabbinic commentators have compared the building of the Tabernacle to the creation of the world itself.

March 24-25, 2023 Vayikrah Leviticus 1:1-5:26

"Vayikrah" is both the name of the book, which in English is translated as Leviticus, and the name of our Torah portion. While the book contains sacrificial practices which are completely out of date, the issue of the proper form of atonement for modern Jews is a contemporary one. According to some rabbinic commentators, prayer has replaced sacrifice for the modern Jew. The description of what constitutes sin in Leviticus demonstrates the ethical principles of our tradition. In Judaism, each individual must take responsibility for making amends to God: no person can sacrifice her or his life for another's.

March 31-April 1, 2023 Tzav Leviticus 6:1-8:36

G-d instructs Moses to teach Aaron and his sons the rights and duties they will take on in becoming priests. They, and their descendants, will be the ones to offer the sacrifices in the Sanctuary. A fire on the holy altar must be kept burning at all times in preparation for the sacrifices. The Kohanim (priests) must learn the variety of different offerings for peace, sin and guilt, and practice very specific rituals regarding each. Aaron and his sons remain in the sanctuary compound for seven days, and Moses initiates them into the priesthood.
