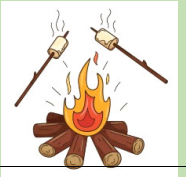

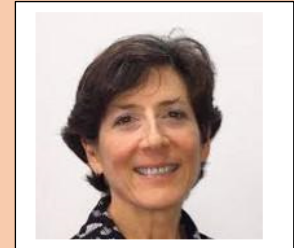

Kulanu, Hebrew for "all of us," is an Anti-Defamation League program dedicated to empowering congregations to address antisemitism and hate in their communities through education, community engagement, and advocacy.

Dena Marks is the Senior Associate Director of the Anti-Defamation League's Southwest Regional Office. At the ADL, she coordinates publicity and serves as a liaison with law enforcement, facilitates various training sessions, coordinates regional fact finding, handles some discrimination complaints and staffs ADL's International Affairs Committee and Committee on Law Enforcement, Extremism and Antisemitism.

RABBI'S MESSAGE

Mazel Tov on your Engagement!

Jewish people all over the world celebrated festive and elaborate week-long engagement parties a few weeks ago, beginning the evening of the 14th day of the Hebrew month of Nissan. The engagement parties included special foods, singing, storytelling and fellowship. The special foods were available to us all week long, and then we went back to our regular diets to continue an engagement period lasting seven full weeks, preparing for the big “wedding day” fifty days later on the 6th day of Sivan.

The engagement parties I am referring to, of course, are Passover seders, leading up to the wedding of Shavuot. As the Passover story begins the action of leaving Egypt for a new life, the commitment is formalized when our people accept the Ten Commandments at Mount Sinai. We know there is a three-part process of marital partnership: first the engagement, then the wedding, and THEN...the marriage! Once we formally accept a covenant with a life partner, the marriage begins. And when our wandering ancestors formally accepted a covenant with G-d, it was the start of a very long, never-ending relationship.

When I was in my 20's I remember when a couple of friends began to date. Another friend asked me, “Do you think they'll end up together?” I wanted to know what she meant by the phrase “end up.” “You know,” she said. “Get married.” Smart aleck that I was, I asked, “Is that the end?” Of course not. It's the beginning.

Each year when we re-tell the story of the Exodus, we rekindle the notion that we are beginning a new life, a new marriage, with the same partner. Observing Shavuot is like renewing wedding vows. We refresh our commitment to Torah. Over the years, I have officiated several ceremonies of renewal of wedding vows, including couples at Temple Beth Torah and even my own parents. After 25 years or 30 or 40 years of marriage (in my parents' case, it was 47), you take on the commitment with a different maturity. Our ancestors in the desert were very young in their relationship with G-d. After centuries of reviving our dedication, we've grown as a people. Rabbis, scholars and lay people have studied the Torah and Talmud over the generations and discovered new ways to observe old traditions.

No matter what, the marriage between G-d and the Jewish people will not end with divorce. Like any relationship, we will experience difficulties and tension, sometimes even feeling separate or disconnected. But G-d is always there. Every Pesach, every Shavuot, every Shabbat and every day, we have the opportunity to remember and revitalize our relationship. The holidays, festivals and celebrations remind us of those commitments. The community, our fellow children of G-d, are visible reminders that the relationship is everlasting.

An engagement and a wedding are moments in time. The ongoing marriage is a lifelong journey. With G-d's help, we walk it together.

Torah Portions for May 2023

Summarized by Rabbi Dan Gordon

May 5-6, 2023 **Emor, Leviticus 21:1-24:23**

Emor begins with instructions for the priests, who were considered separate from others. Priests could not have any blemishes and had to refrain from any activity that could potentially contaminate their purity. Several rituals are described, including setting aside a portion of “cake” as a burnt offering. In modern times, this burnt offering is still practiced by many who bake challah. We are also given instructions for harvesting our fields. We are to leave the corners for poor people to be able to glean what they need without the embarrassment of having to ask.

May 12-13, 2023 **Behar/Bechukotai, Leviticus 25:1-27:34 (double portion)**

Just as people and animals must observe a Sabbath every seven days, the land must have a Sabbath every seven years. The land will produce enough in the sixth year to provide for the seventh, so no harvesting shall take place. In the fiftieth year, on Yom Kippur, a jubilee is celebrated. Debts are reduced and slaves are freed. The Torah portion ends with a reminder of the prohibitions of idolatry and the obligation to observe the weekly Sabbath. This reminds us that freedom always comes with responsibility, and the Jubilee year is no exception.

In Bechukotai, G-d promises that there will be great rewards for following the proper path of the commandments. Not only will the rain come at the proper times and produce our necessary food, but we will also live without fear of enemies. G-d will remember the promises made to Jacob, Isaac and to Abraham (curiously listed here in reverse order) to help us maintain our homeland. We’re also commanded to tithe, donating ten percent of all we gain, realizing that all our gifts come from G-d.

May 19-20, 2023 **Bamidbar, Numbers 1:1-4:20**

At the beginning of the Book of Numbers, Moses is instructed to take a census of the entire Israelite nation. Each of the tribes is listed with their descendants, and a number is assigned to each. Each tribe is given specific tasks. Aaron and his sons prepare the sacred objects and curtains connected to the Ark of the Covenant, where the tablets of the Ten Commandments are carried throughout the desert. This year, in preparation for the festival of Shavuot, Manny Miller will be reading the Ten Commandments, which solidify the covenant between G-d and the Jewish people.

May 26-27, 2023

Special Readings for Shavuot, Exodus 19:1-20:23 and Numbers 28:26-31

On Shavuot, it is traditional to read the story of our experience in the desert that leads up to receiving the Ten Commandments, and then hearing Moses recite the commandments to us. Even before hearing the words, the Israelites proclaimed in unison, “All that the LORD has spoken, we shall do!” Prior to Moses’ visit with G-d to bring down the Law, there was an intense preparation period. The drama of thunder, lightning, smoke and fire, emphasized the importance of this moment. Following the recitation of the Commandments, the Torah reading is followed by the extensive sacrifice rituals, which include offering the first fruits.

GENERAL FUND

Any donation that is not specified to another specific fund goes to the General Fund, which helps maintain the operating budget of the temple. Building expenses, insurance, staff salaries and all program expenses that are not underwritten come out of the General Fund, as well as support for the Religious School.

RABBI'S DISCRETIONARY FUND

This separate tzedakah fund enables the rabbi to make confidential contributions to help individuals and causes that may be in crisis. The rabbi may also use this fund to help support unbudgeted programs that will benefit the temple or community.

BURT LEVY MEMORIAL LIBRARY AND BEAUTIFICATION FUND

This fund maintains the library and helps purchase new books, as well as other cosmetic improvements to the temple's interior. Our library, located in the back of the sanctuary, is named after TBT's founding president, Burt Levy, who was a major inspiration in starting Temple Beth Torah.

TRACY TOBIN JOHNSON MEMORIAL EDUCATION FUND

This fund provides scholarships to Jewish summer camps for children and for educational conferences for teachers. It also helps support special educational programs that are not in the general budget.
