Worship Services in August

RABBI'S MESSAGE

Spiritual, Religious or Both?

It's no secret attendance at synagogues on High Holidays is higher than any other time of the year. Jews who are disconnected from synagogues are more likely to come on Rosh Hashana or Yom Kippur. Yet statistics reveal that Jews who connect with Judaism just once a year are more likely to celebrate Passover or Hanukkah at home than go to synagogue. Regardless of the label – Orthodox, Reform, Conservative, or other – the fastest growing group of Jews is the unaffiliated.

Often, I meet people who identify as "spiritual but not religious." They may follow that with "I believe in God, but I don't like organized religion." When I hear that, I'm tempted to show them a picture of my office desk and show them how "disorganized" a religious leader can be!

"Organized religion" can seem complicated and troublesome. I even heard a synagogue president (not from my synagogue) say "Now I know why the Torah never calls our people as 'the GROWNUPS' of Israel." Torah chronicles how we complained in the wilderness searching for the Promised Land, and it seems we haven't stopped complaining. This year, on Erev Tish B'Av this year (commemorating the destruction of the Holy Temple in Jerusalem), a rabbi posted on Facebook that modern synagogues are no longer "relevant, appropriate or helpful," and are becoming (in his opinion) outdated the same way that ancient Temple rituals became outdated. He suggests that today's synagogue lacks spiritual inspiration needed to invigorate present and future generations. Another rabbi responded to the post, excited to open a dialogue that can be "an example in our democratic and technological era of what a Rabbinical exchange in Talmudic times could have looked like!"

Having a rabbinic conversation from California to Argentina to Texas is reminiscent of the conversations Talmudic rabbis had over the generations. Technology gives us the opportunity to connect more globally, but the connections are diluted by distance. During COVID, countless worshippers watched computer screens rather than gathering. Some got used to it. Others found ways of connecting to communities despite the stumbling blocks of distance. But nothing beats being together, sharing a snack, pondering a concept and disputing a philosophical idea.

Today's rabbis are wondering how we can inspire modern Jews looking for spirituality but not always finding at *shul*. For those who feel disconnected from the spiritual, it can begin with friendship. Pirke Avot (Ethics of our Ancestors) says, "Don't separate yourself from community." (1:6) and "Acquire for yourself a friend." (2:5) After all, each person, created in God's image, has a spark of Divine spirit. Together, friends can motivate each other to re-create the kind of community that IS meaningful and inspirational. And our New Year can begin with exciting potential.

The minimum donation for one memorial plaque to be placed on the wall in the sanctuary remains \$300. However, those purchasing **two plaques at the same time can do so for \$500, a savings of \$100**. It usually takes at least a month for a plaque to be engraved and sent back to the temple, but in the summer months, it can take longer because many synagogues are purchasing plaques to be ready for High Holidays. You may consult with the rabbi for the Hebrew name and date by emailing Rabbi Dan Gordon at <u>rabbi@tbthumble.org</u> Checks must be sent to TBT prior to the plaque being ordered.

Torah Portions for August 2023

Summarized by Rabbi Dan Gordon

August 4-5, 2023 Eikev, Deuteronomy 7:12-11:25

As the Israelites prepare to cross the Jordan River, Moses recounts events that brought them to this point. He reminds the people that they were tested by hardships, but also given help. They were hungry, but received manna, because "man does not live on bread alone" (Deut. 8:3). We should be prepared to be tested again. Moses also retells of the journey to bring G-d's tablets, breaking then when seeing the Golden Calf, and bringing a new set as the people repent. We are reminded of the rewards that come from loyally fulfilling the Commandments.

August 11-12, 2023 Re'eh, Deuteronomy 11:26-16:17

This Torah portion reminds us that we have a choice, to follow good or evil. Following good will bring blessings and life; following evil will bring curses and death. "Choose life," we're taught. Appropriately included in this section is the obligation to tithe a portion of our earnings to the poor. We are also taught to be generous to those in need when it comes to lending money. The seventh year is one of freedom; we are commanded to forgive debts and free slaves in the seventh year. The three festivals of pilgrimage, Passover, Shavuot and Sukkot are described in detail.

August 18-19, 2023 Shoftim, Deuteronomy 16:18-21:9 Bribery is forbidden and honesty is valued over all. Other governmental layers are described, including priests and even, eventually, kings. Kings must not be tempted by too much money or too many wives. The king must always keep a Torah with him, reminding him that God is the ultimate authority. Refuge cities are set up for those who kill accidentally. The death penalty is for malicious murder, but only with the collaboration of two or three eye witnesses; one witness is not sufficient. In the case of an unsolved murder, the priests are to pray for atonement for the whole city. We are instructed to appoint judges, and to make sure the judges are fair with all their decisions.

August 25-26,2018 Ki Tetze, Deuteronomy 21:10-25:19 There are seventy-two commandments in *Ki Tetze*, the largest number in any Torah portion. Topics covered include marriage and divorce, defiant children, fair weights and measures and charity for the poor. At the end of the *parsha* we are instructed to "blot out the memory of Amalek from under heaven." Many of the regulations teach us about righteous living. Others, such as how to handle a defiant child, convey problematic approaches that must be studied in the context of time, and perhaps should be read metaphorically.

GENERAL FUND

Building expenses, insurance, staff salaries and all program expenses that are not underwritten come out of the General Fund, as well as support for the Religious School.

RABBI'S DISCRETIONARY FUND

This separate tzedakah fund enables the rabbi to make confidential contributions to help individuals and causes that may be in crisis. The rabbi may also use this fund to help support unbudgeted programs that will benefit the temple or community.

BURT LEVY MEMORIAL LIBRARY AND BEAUTIFICATION

FUND This fund maintains the library and helps purchase new books, as well as other cosmetic improvements to the temple's interior. Our library, located in the back of the sanctuary, is named after TBT's founding president, Burt Levy, who was a major inspiration in starting Temple Beth Torah.

TRACY TOBIN JOHNSON MEMORIAL EDUCATION FUND

This fund provides scholarships to Jewish summer camps for children and for educational conferences for teachers. It also helps support special educational programs that are not in the general budget. The fund honors Tracy Tobin Johnson, who was an active TBT member, volunteer and teacher before passing away at a young age.
