RABBI'S MESSAGE

Making the New Year New

Why is this year different from all other years? Yes, this is like the opening of the Four Questions of the Passover Seder. On Passover, we say, "Why is this night different from all other nights?" But Passover is a week, not a night. It is a week that we remember our oppression and appreciate our freedom. Likewise, Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur are not merely singular days on the calendar. They are meant to inspire us, not for a day, or even ten days...but all year long. Rabbi Shlomo Carlebach, a man who began life as a Hasid and later motivated a generation with his music, composed the following song as a way to begin a year:

Return again...return again...return to the land of your soul. Return to who you are; Return to what you are; Return to where you are... Born and reborn again...return again...return again...

This song focuses on the Hebrew concept of *teshuvah*, which we understand to mean "repentance," but literally means "return." In the traditional liturgy on Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur, we wonder, "Who shall live and who shall die?" We plead for G-d's mercy, hopefully stating that "*tefilah*, *tzedakah*, *v'teshuva* – prayer, charity and repentance – will temper a severe decree."

If repentance and return are synonymous, to what are we returning? In Rabbi Carlebach's song, we return to our soul and to our past, somehow starting over again. The slow, pensive music he composed implies that this *teshuvah*, this return, is an ongoing, never-ending process. The liturgy implies that our actions make a difference in the way G-d delivers justice and mercy. I suggest that it might be more about our own behavior than about G-d's actions. If we are hoping to "temper a severe decree," maybe it's not about avoiding severe circumstances; it's about embracing even the most difficult times with a kind of peace and calm that helps us through.

As I've been mentally and emotionally preparing for the New Year, I've been thinking about this concept of return. Our normal way of aging is to move forward, not backwards. We hope to grow and change for the better. We want to learn from our mistakes and become better people based on what we have learned. Where is there room for a return?

Children help us remember that level of return. Remember the excitement of marveling at something new? I'm taken back to my youth when I hear a question I've never heard before, or see that "aha!" look when a child "gets it." Bar and bat mitzvah students often amaze me when they discover an aspect of Torah I hadn't before considered. We might think "There is nothing new under the sun," as suggested in the Book of Ecclesiates (1:9), but every day someone – often a child – uncovers a new truth. When the Jewish Americana musician, Joe Buchanan led a service at Temple Beth Torah, he said, "This exact combination of people and voices has never before been together and never will be again." Each moment is a new, unique opportunity.

On Yom Kippur, we contemplate where we've sinned and how we've fallen short of complete goodness and innocence. Perhaps the return we long for is a return to the innocence of our youth. Return to remembering to what it's like to find something new, to learn something exciting and invigorating, making us want to shout, "Wow!" Rediscovering the innocence we had when assumed that each new person we meet is a potential friend, and not someone who might be out to get us.

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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE:

As we quickly approach our High Holiday season, I think it is important that we are reminded of our responsibility as Jews to reaffirm our covenant with God and continue our traditions, while we stay diligent in teaching our children and the generations to come. I am reminded of the poem "first they came " and I want to be more dedicated to tikkun olam. I pledge to focus on helping others and continue to be active in helping repair the world, especially in this time that we are recuperating from the chaos of the last few years. The new year is a time to rededicate ourselves to our Judaism and envelop each other in love. I wish you much peace and joy for this new year!

Torah Portions for September 2023

Summarized by Rabbi Dan Gordon

September 1-2, Ki Tavo Deuteronomy 26:1-29:8

The *parshah* begins with a description of a ceremony to commemorate the occupation of the land. Some of every first fruit of the soil will be given to the priest as the exodus experience is retold. A tenth of the yield must be set-aside for the Levite, the stranger, the fatherless and the widow. Blessings and curses, some extremely graphic, are recited to motivate the people to observe the covenant.

September 8-9, Nitzavim / Va-Yelech Deuteronomy 29:9-31:1-30

Nitzavim is read twice a year: once on its calendar date and once on Yom Kippur. It is no mere recapitulation but instead is a talk about the future. Moses' speech to the Israelites just before they enter the Land of Israel reveals that in Judaism, belief flows from behavior. The actions – rituals as well as deeds of kindness – help inspire our faith. Moses reminds the Israelites that G-d's words, teachings and spirit are not meant to be distant, but are close to us, in our hearts.

In *Vayelech* Moses announces to the Israelites that at one hundred and twenty years old, he is no longer active. He publicly transfers his authority to Joshua and empowers the Levites to bring the Teachings of the Torah into the Ark of Covenant. Moses warns the Israelites to remember all of G-d's commandments by re-reading the teachings even after his own death.

September 15-16, Rosh Hashanah – Bereshit 1:1-2:4

The beginning of the year and the beginning of the world! On Rosh Hashana we relive G-d's plan of creation. At the beginning of the first week of creation, resources are brought into the world: light, land, water. The second part of the week focuses on those things that use the resources: stars and planets, birds and fish and mammals, including human beings. With human beings, we find the first examples of free choice (eating the forbidden fruit) and emotional actions (Cain's murder of Abel). We start the year contemplating the choices we plan to make in the future.

September 22-23, Ha'Azinu Deuteronomy 32:1-52

Moses, nearing the end of his life, uses poetry and song to recount the journey in the desert. At the conclusion of the song, G-d instructs Moses to climb to the top of Mount Nebo, overlooking the Jordan River. This is where Moses will die, able to see the Promised Land, but not enter it. G-d explains this is because Moses broke faith with Him when he struck the rock. Moses is 120 years old.

September 29-30, Sukkot Torah Reading, Exodus 33:12-34:26

The Torah reading on Shabbat during the intermediate day of Sukkot includes the dramatic story in which Israelites form a Golden Calf when Moses is taking a long time to return from Mount Sinai. Despite this action, G-d instructs Moses to construct a new set of tablets, since he smashed the first set. According to Torah, while G-d wrote the first set of tablets, Moses must make the second set himself. On Sukkot, shortly after we have experienced Yom Kippur, it is a good lesson of second chances, and taking responsibility for our actions. Moses behaved in an angry manner when he smashed the tablets and took responsibility by making the second set.

GENERAL FUND

BURT LEVY MEMORIAL LIBRARY AND BEAUTIFICATION

FUND This fund maintains the library and helps purchase new books, as well as other cosmetic improvements to the temple's interior. Our library, located in the back of the sanctuary, is named after TBT's founding president, Burt Levy, who was a major inspiration in starting Temple Beth Torah.
