RABBI'S MESSAGE

An Optimist - Even Now

Usually, I am not a fan of labels, though I do find them helpful at times. I find many labels limiting, because often the labeling hints that everyone who shares the same label thinks a certain way, and shares all the same opinions. Labels like Progressive, Liberal, Conservative, Orthodox, Democrat, Republican, Right Wing, Left Wing, Moderate and more tend to pigeon-hole people in the eyes of others. Particularly when those who identify themselves as belonging to one category talk about those in another category. It is often misrepresentation, assuming what another person believes. Even in Judaism, the common labels of Orthodox, Conservative and Reform suggest a belief system and a practice that may not apply to everyone who connects with that category. When people ask me, "What kind of rabbi are you?" expecting to one of those three labels, they are often confused by my answer: "*A Jewish one*." My learning has been from a variety of sources, and I try to relate to that diversity by not assuming that labels define our identity.

One label that I've tried to wear with pride most of my life, has become more difficult since October 7, the violent day that the war between Hamas and Israel began. The barbaric, surprise attacks by Hamas murdering, injuring and kidnapping innocent civilians was among the most horrific acts we've seen in our lifetime. Israel was forced to respond with military force. Despite the fact that Israel warned the citizens of Gaza to move out of dangerous areas, people have been killed and lives have been disrupted on both sides of Gaza's border with Israel. Real people, on both sides, are living in fear. Hostages were taken by Hamas, and the loved ones of those hostages live with the horrible mystery of not knowing what is happening.

The situation is much too complicated for me to go into point by point. Innocent civilians, just trying to live their lives while praying for the right to live in peace, have their worlds turned upside down by attackers who have denied Israel's right to exist. Israel has been accused of being the aggressor, even though their response to the Hamas attacks was defensive. But make no mistake: this war is not about religious values. It is not Muslims versus Jews. Jewish teaching in the Mishnah states that "anyone who destroys a life is considered by Scripture to have destroyed an entire world; and anyone who saves a life is as if he saved an entire world." (Sanhedrin 4:5) Islam teaches the EXACT same thing! (Quran 5:32)

While I do believe there is evil in the world, I believe it is not inherent genetically. Christianity teaches that we are all born with Original Sin, from Adam and Eve eating the forbidden fruit from the Tree of Knowledge of Good and Bad, and baptizing babies helps cleanse them of that sin. Judaism does not teach that we are born sinful. We learn hatred from others, from stereotypes, from misinformation and from bad examples. The source of hatred and mistrust is hard to fathom. There are infinite possible theories about the origin of hatred, but the lyrics from this song performed in the musical South Pacific seem to sum it up:

You've got to be taught to hate and fear, You've got to be taught from year to year, It's got to be drummed in your dear little ear, You've got to be carefully taught.

You've got to be taught before it's too late, Before you are six or seven or eight, To hate all the people your relatives hate, You've got to be carefully taught!

If we can learn to hate, we can learn to love. A few days ago, I had lunch with a group of fourteen community leaders – seven rabbis and seven Muslim religious leaders. We talked about the current crisis and how our roles as both religious leaders and members of a community help form our different perspectives. We talked about blame, and how unhelpful it is to focus our energies there. And we got to know each other as human beings. *B'tzelem Elohim*, in the image of G-d. Though many of our ideas and practices are different, we share what it means to be human. It is only through human outreach can we prevent hatred and misunderstanding. Then, G-d willing, we can sing a new song:

You've got to be taught to love and learn When difficult feelings begin to churn Get close to the light; it will not burn You've got to be carefully taught.

We all need to learn, while there's still time Before the kids are seven, or eight or nine Remember G-d' made us all from the Divine We have to be carefully taught.

Some say one random act of kindness can unknowingly provide a ripple affect that can be felt across the globe. As Rabbi Shammai taught: "*Say little and do much; and greet the world with a smile on your face.*" Pirke Avot: 1-16.

As wartime continues to feel discouraging, let's remember that we CAN

change the world...one person at a time.

SAVE THE DATE – SCHOLARS IN RESIDENCE IN COOPERATION WITH YOM LIMMUD FEBRUARY 2-4

Temple Beth Torah has once again been blessed with a program grant in cooperation with Yom Limmud weekend. Yom Limmud is a city-wide program of the Jewish Federation of Greater Houston to provide education and entertainment. It is endowed by the Barish Family and Chair King. For 2024, the thirtieth year of Yom Limmud in Houston, the day of learning will be Sunday, February 4, at Congregation Emanu El, 1500 Sunset Blvd. Each year, a "Shabbat Limmud Scholars" committee reviews applications from Houston area synagogues to bring in guest educators who will present for the individual synagogue during Shabbat weekend, and also speak at Yom Limmud for the city. Shirley Barish, of blessed memory, was one of the founders of both the Coalition for Alternatives in Jewish Education and the local Yom Limmud in Houston. She and her husband, Marvin, have both passed away, and their son, David has continued in their footsteps.

TBT's grant proposal was accepted, and we are delighted to welcome **Rabbi David Zaslow** and his wife **Debra Gordon Zaslow**. Rabbi David is the longtime religious leader of Congregation Shir Hadash (a new song) in Ashland, Oregon, and is a respected leader in the Jewish Renewal movement. He visited Temple Beth Torah several years ago, and presented a lecture on Zoom for us during Covid. Rabbi Zaslow is a dynamic education, musician, songwriter and prayer leader and author. He has written prayerbooks, poetry and study guides, including *Reimagining Exodus: A Freedom Story* and *Jesus: First Century Rabbi*.

Debra Zaslow is a *Maggidah* – one who shares sacred stories. She and our own Rabbi Dan Gordon have collaborated at several conferences. She teaches storytelling at Southern Oregon University, and with her husband, lead a Maggid Training Program that guides and certifies Jewish storytellers and educators.

On **Friday, February 2**, after a Shabbat dinner and discussion, Rabbis Zaslow and Gordon will collaborate in leading a spiritual, musical and inspirational Shabbat service. The Torah portion that Shabbat includes the Ten Commandments, and Rabbi Zaslow will help us reimagine Exodus, as his book title inspires us to do. Saturday evening, February 3, will include dinner and discussion, a musical Havdallah service, and then an interfaith storytelling concert led by the Zaslows, with a cameo by Rabbi Dan. On Sunday, February 4, both Rabbi David and Maggidah Debra will present at Emanu El for Yom Limmud. The Rabbi will discuss his fascinating book Jesus: First Century Rabbi, and the Maggidah will lead an experiential story writing workshop.

More information will be available in the next few months. Our guests are partially funded by a grant from the Jewish Federation, and those in the TBT community who wish to contribute toward subsidizing the program should contact Rabbi Dan Gordon or treasurer, Lenny Simmons.

Torah Portions for November 2023

Summarized by Rabbi Dan Gordon

November 3-4, 2023, Vayeira, Genesis 18:1-22:24

There are many tests in this Torah portion. Visitors come to see Abraham, and he welcomes them with extraordinary hospitality. Sarah and Abraham learn that, despite their advanced years, they will have a son together. Sarah laughs at the possibility, leading to the child being named Isaac ("she will laugh). G-d consults with Abraham about His plan to destroy Sodom and Gemorrah, and Abraham negotiates a plan to try to save the city. Later, Abraham is tested by being asked by G-d to sacrifice Isaac. Abraham is prepared to make this ultimate sacrifice before an angel of G-d stops him, and a ram is sacrificed instead of his son.

November 10-11, 2023, Chaya Sarah, Genesis 23:1-25:18

Almost immediately after the near-death of her son, Sarah dies at 127 years old. Abraham wants to make sure she has an honorable burial. Though the landowner offers to give him burial land for free, Abraham insists on paying the full price. He then sends his servant to look for a wife for Isaac. Rebecca, a distant cousin, is chosen because her kindness to humans and animals indicates a unique sensitivity.

November 17-18, 2023, Toldot, Genesis 25:19-28:9

The most volatile sibling rivalry since Cain and Abel begins with the twins, Esau and Jacob, battling in the womb. Mother Rebecca is told by G-d that the greater of the two shall serve the younger. Esau sells Jacob his birthright for some soup, and Jacob collects the blessing of the firstborn with Rebecca's help. Having built a brotherly relationship based on trickery, deceit and manipulation, Jacob and Esau realize that the town isn't big enough for both of them. Both brothers go to uncles. Jacob travels to Rebecca's father's house (where he will marry both of Laban's daughters), and Esau finds himself a wife from the daughters of Uncle Ishmael.

November 24-25, 2023, Vayeitzei, Genesis 28:10-32:3

Along his journey, Jacob experiences G-d's presence through dreaming of a ladder with angels ascending and descending from heaven. He pledges himself to G-d and continues to his uncle Laban's home. He falls in love with Laban's daughter, Rachel and asks to marry her. He promises to work for Laban for seven years to marry his daughter, but is surprised to find the older sister, Leah, in his wedding bed. Laban informs him it is customary to marry the older child first, so Jacob pledges another seven years of labor to marry Rachel. Leah is more fertile, bearing six sons and a daughter. Rachel pleads to G-d for children, and eventually bears Joseph and Benjamin.

GENERAL FUND

Any donation that is not specified to another specific fund goes to the General Fund, which helps maintain the operating budget of the temple. Building expenses, insurance, staff salaries and all program expenses that are not underwritten come out of the General Fund, as well as support for the Religious School.

RABBI'S DISCRETIONARY FUND

This separate tzedakah fund enables the rabbi to make confidential contributions to help individuals and causes that may be in crisis. The rabbi may also use this fund to help support unbudgeted programs that will benefit the temple or community.

BURT LEVY MEMORIAL LIBRARY AND BEAUTIFICATION

FUND This fund maintains the library and helps purchase new books, as well as other cosmetic improvements to the temple's interior. Our library, located in the back of the sanctuary, is named after TBT's founding president, Burt Levy, who was a major inspiration in starting Temple Beth Torah.

TRACY TOBIN JOHNSON MEMORIAL EDUCATION FUND

This fund provides scholarships to Jewish summer camps for children and for educational conferences for teachers. It also helps support special educational programs that are not in the general budget. The fund honors Tracy Tobin Johnson, who was an active TBT member, volunteer and teacher before passing away at a young age.

This fund supports special dynamic programs, often related to the arts. It is named after Tom Theriot, a lover of the arts, who was a constant presence at TBT and supported every cause.
