RABBI'S MESSAGE

The Gift of Time

I have a friend who was born on February 29. I'm not sure what year she was born, but she claims to only have a birthday every four years. Yes, on Leap Year in the Gregorian Calendar, we add an extra day to the solar calendar so that our years balance out. 365 days are not enough for a full revolution around the sun.

The Gregorian calendar, which almost all of the world uses, is a solar calendar. But the Hebrew calendar is a lunar one, based on the moon. The moon takes 28 or 29 days to cycle, so Hebrew months are slightly shorter than solar months. 12 lunar months make up a total of 354 days, about 11 fewer days than the 365.25 days of the solar cycle. So instead of one day every four years, the Hebrew calendar adds one month every 2-3 years in a complicated pattern that amounts to 7 times every 19 years. And this year, 5784, is leap year!

Just imagine...how often do we complain that there is not enough time to do what we need to do? It seems to last our whole lives. When we were children, homework assignments and papers always seemed to be due before we were ready. As adults, April 15 Income Tax Day creeps us on us, as do all the rest of the deadlines to pay bills, register to vote, get our cars inspected, etc.

This year, we get an extra month. The current month of **Shevat** (which includes Tu Beshevat, the blessing of the trees) follows **Adar** (which includes Purim), and then comes **Nisan** (which includes Passover). Those who clean their homes and change dishes for Passover may find themselves scrambling to get ready. But we insert an extra Adar, giving us all more time. During Leap Year, Adar I is followed by Adar II.

Technically, the reason why we insert an extra month is to correct the calendar and to make sure that Passover is always in the spring. This is important because Passover represents the rebirth of our people, as we emerge from the dark times of slavery into the world of freedom. If not for the Leap Year formula, Passover would move up into winter. And it corrects the rest of the calendar, too. It means that Hanukkah, the Festival of Lights, remains in the darkest month to allow our candles to shine brightly. It means that Sukkot, the Festival of the Harvest, includes the brightest moon and comes at a time when our ancestors gathered their crops. The practical aspects of a Leap Year, like many things in Judaism, make sense.

On a more philosophical level, now that we know there is an extra full month this year, how can we use it in a way that enhances ourselves and enhances the world? Perhaps read an extra book or learn something we always wanted to learn. Embark on a new exercise or food regiment that can be springboard for better health. Connect with old friends who we miss or make a new friend to enrich our lives. Give a little time toward volunteering for a cause or visit someone who needs company. Pick up some groceries for someone who is homebound. Or maybe, just relax with some quiet time, breathing in the air of freedom and reminding ourselves that <u>we</u> are the ones who decide how to best use our time. It's easy to forget.

I hope during Adar II, I will feel less hurried, and be able to devote this precious time to caring for others AND for myself.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE:

This happens to be a favorite time of year for me. I know a lot of people don't feel that way. Many say, "It's cold and rainy and icky out." People just want to stay home and light a fire and not go anywhere. So, what do we, as Jews, do during this time? We celebrate trees and get ready to plant! Last weekend at Sunday school, we planted seeds with all the kids as part of Tu Beshevat. While the rest of the world may be curling up under their blankets, we are coming together to plant! We celebrate trees and growing things by planting seeds and getting them ready to grow. In a few weeks, when it starts to warm up outside, we will come back together, and plant the seedlings in the garden at the temple. We have peppers, parsley and oregano all getting started and ready to go in the ground. While we are waiting for our seeds to sprout, we will join the rest of the Houston Jewish community at Yom Limmud, a day of learning (February 4 at Congregation Emanu El). Once again, a very Jewish tradition: coming together as a group to learn about Judaism and the world around us; a day to come together, to question, to agree and to disagree. This is one of the greatest strengths and things about Judaism that I love so much. "Blind faith" is not the Jewish way. If you do not agree with an interpretation, there are many sources that provide alternatives. If you don't like any of them, you can come up with your own to discuss with others while working through it. I have never heard a Rabbi, or a Jewish person say, "Believe because I said you should!" We talk, we discuss, we disagree, and sometimes even arque but we don't try to force others to change what they believe or think. Teaching and learning are central to being a Jew. That is one of the greatest things I have encountered in my life, and a main reason why I embrace Judaism.

When we take the time to learn together, we are planting seeds of inspiration that, with warmth, can blossom into real wisdom. So, this month, let's all try to learn something new, as together, we plant the seeds that lead us into the future.

Several times during the COVID pandemic, TBT's Zoom services were brought to life by Rabbi Yakira Yedidia and family. Now, four of the band members will be coming to Texas, exclusively for Temple Beth Torah! They will be with us all weekend, leading Friday night services, special Shabbat programs on Saturday and helping our Religious School students and adults on Sunday embracing the joy of learning. Their musical spirit and love of Judaism caught the attention of our TBT community, and we are very excited to be able to enjoy their talents here and up close! Rabbi Yakira has written several books about learning to read Hebrew, and has a unique method that children and adults can easily follow.

This weekend is made possible by a special donation by former TBT member **Dale Israel Vine**, of blessed memory. Dale started coming to Temple Beth Torah in the spring of 2019, after years of curiosity about Judaism. Born in Louisiana in 1947, Dale had lived in Houston most of his adult life, often in the heart of the Jewish community in the Meyerland/Bellair area. He was a passionate student of religion, learning several languages. He completed his conversion to Judaism shortly before his 70th birthday, with a Beit Din (rabbinic court) led by Rabbi Dan Gordon.

When TBT began Zoom services during the pandemic, Dale immediately fell in love with the YedidYah Family Band. He wrote to the group and bought several CD's that he gave as gifts. Having them perform and teach at Temple Beth Torah was one of his dreams.

Dale joined Temple Beth Torah's **Legacy Program** by choosing to leave a gift to TBT in his will, helping to ensure our future. When he passed away in 2022, shortly after his 75th birthday, the temple was informed of his generosity. Because of Dale's love of Judaism, Jewish music and specifically the YedidYah Family Band, the Board of Directors chose to honor his memory with a musical/educational weekend. With additional help from the **Goldstaub Fund** from the **Houston Jewish Community Foundation,** TBT is able to sponsor the band and its activities in Dale's memory.

Torah Portions for February 2024

Summarized by Rabbi Dan Gordon

February 2-3, 2024 Yitro Exodus 18:1-20:23

Yitro, the portion named for Moses' father-in-law, begins with the Midianite priest's stunning confession that "the Lord is greater than all gods." Wise Jethro sees that Moses is taking too much on his own shoulders, and counsels his son-in-law to delegate his authority. The Ten Commandments are given by God in *Yitro*, amidst thunder and lightning, through Moses' voice. These commandments begin our relationship as a people with a special covenant with God that includes special responsibilities. They are not referred to as "Ten Commandments" at this point, and later called in Hebrew "*Aseret Dibrot*," or "Ten Words/Utterances." How the ten are divided differs between Judaism and Christianity, as well as within some Christian denominations.

February 9-10, 2024 Mishpatim Exodus 21:1-24:18

"Mishpatim" means "rules," "laws" or "ordinances," and seems disorganized to the modern reader because the rules were meant to be remembered through hearing rather than reading. Both ritual and ethical laws are given in Mishpatim. Some of the most important laws concern ethical treatment for the stranger, the widow and the orphan. The first laws given after the Ten Commandments include treatment of slaves. While we were not forbidden to have slaves, we were commanded to treat them in a certain manner, which included offering freedom after seven years. It is a valuable lesson to remember, since we had just come out of slavery. Sometimes, we are expected to do the opposite of the examples of what we've observed from our experiences. In this case, we're expected to treat servants how we would have liked to have been treated, rather than how we were treated.

February 16-17, 2024 Terumah, Exodus 25:1-27:19

We receive an elaborate description of how the Tabernacle is to be constructed, from the kind of wood used to the fabric for the drapes. Even though the construction is described in very elegant terms, we are encouraged only to make offerings from our hearts. A center piece in the Tabernacle will be the seven-branched menorah, which will be kept lit in an eternal light, signifying God's constant presence.

February 23-24, 2024 Tetzaveh Exodus 27:20-30:10

This Torah portion describes the elaborate procedure involved in ordaining the priestly family, Aaron's descendants, who will be known as "Kohanim." Their clothes and their lives distinguish them as servants of both G-d and the people. They must take their roles extremely seriously, as they represent their sacred rituals will represent the Israelites to G-d. The portion begins with instructions for the "ner tamid" or Eternal Light, that reminds both of G-d's everlasting presence and our eternal relationship and devotion.

GENERAL FUND - Any donation that is not specified to another specific fund goes to the General Fund, which helps maintain the operating budget of the temple. Building expenses, insurance, staff salaries and all program expenses that are not underwritten come out of the General Fund, as well as support for the Religious School.

RABBI'S DISCRETIONARY FUND - This separate tzedakah fund enables the rabbi to make confidential contributions to help individuals and causes that may be in crisis. The rabbi may also use this fund to help support unbudgeted programs that will benefit the temple or community.

BURT LEVY MEMORIAL LIBRARY AND BEAUTIFICATION

FUND This fund maintains the library and helps purchase new books, as well as other cosmetic improvements to the temple's interior. Our library, located in the back of the sanctuary, is named after TBT's founding president, Burt Levy, who was a major inspiration in starting Temple Beth Torah.

TRACY TOBIN JOHNSON MEMORIAL EDUCATION FUND - This fund provides scholarships to Jewish summer camps for children and for educational conferences for teachers. It also helps support special educational programs that are not in the general budget. The fund honors Tracy Tobin Johnson, who was an active TBT member, volunteer and teacher before passing away at a young age.

TOM THERIOT MEMORIAL PROGRAM FUND - This fund supports special dynamic programs, often related to the arts. It is named after Tom Theriot, a lover of the arts, who was a constant presence at TBT and supported every cause.
